WANT LOW LEVY.

St. Johns Business Mon Pear Taxes Will Be Too Righ for Comfort. Heavy property owners of St. Johns

Heavy property owners of St. Johns will object strongly to the raising of the tax levy there, and the dream of the council to secure a 10-mill levy on the assessed valuation of \$1,250,000 probably will not be realized. Business men of the town say the present valuation is three times that of last year and that if only the old levy of \$\frac{4}{2}\$ mills for town purposes was made the burden would be triple what it was before.

A smill levy would raise for municipal purposes but \$4,130 during the next year, and as the town has obligations amounting to more than \$3,000 already. It is not believed such a levy would be within \$0 per cent of the nesded amount. In addition to the debt of \$3,000, the recent action of the council in purchasing property for a town hall has laid a \$2,500 burden on the treasury that must be taken into account. Those supporting the 10-mill levy assert that this would put the city on a strong financial basis, with no debts and no outstanding warrants, and would allow the city to make such improvements as are absolutely necessary without dangerous delay. After one year of the high levy it is said the town then could start out with a clear balance sheet and with a \$ or 4 mill tax live within its income.
