Dr. F. F. Tong Says Chinese Emperor Will Issue Edict Adopting Our Styles.

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS WEAR MODERN CLOTHING

Women's Robes to Remain the Same, but Binding Feet May Be Discontinued-Visiting Chinese Lecture Friday Evening.

Over in the sunflower kingdom they are bidding farewell to the flowing robes that have been worn for the past 300 years and to the sinuous queues that for ages have adorsted Mongolian backs. Within two years an imperial edict will be issued abolishing forever the ancient Manchurian costumes and adopting modern American incheds of dress.

adopting modern American methods of dress.

At least so says Dr. F. F. Tong, a representative of the Chinese government, who is in Portland. Dr. Tong is a member of the board of treaty revision appointed by the emperor and was sent to America to study commercial conditions with the view to establishing closer business relations between the United States and China.

The change is already in progress, according to Dr. Tong, and even now government officials are permitted to wear modern clothing. Leas than two years ago such practices would not be tolerated.

## TO AUDIT FREIGHT BILL
