CITY OF CLEVELAND TO REDEEM WATERFRONT

(Journal Special Service.) Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 20.—If the plans of the men who represent Cleveland in the state legislature are carried out the city will soon undertake an enormous task, which will greatly increase the waterfront facilities of the city and add 150 acres of valuable land to the city. It is proposed to fill in about 550 acres on land now submerged by water, to build out into the lake about 10 piers for handling of freight, construct a railroad tunnel under the whole city, to extend the breakwater and add other valuable improvements. It is estimated that the work would cost about \$25,000,000, of which the national government would pay about \$4,500,000. According to conservative estimates the 550 acres of submerged land on the lakefront would represent a value of about \$22,500,000.

HIGH COPPER AIDS OREGON MINES

Nineteen-Cent Market Now Prevailing Expected to Continue for Year.

MARGIN OF PROFIT IT GIVES IS STIMULATING

This Year Saw the First Serious Production in State, and Several Properties Are in Line for Much Heavier Work the Coming Season.

Nothing in the metal mining situation has given Oregon greater encouragement than the rise in copper, and assurance of good authorities that it will continue for at least six months at near 19 cents. Experts have counted the supply on hand throughout the world, the rate of consumption and production, and have concluded that there is no near influence back of the market save legitimate demand. Copper has become so universal in the manufactures, especially in the growing list of electrical machines and fixtures, and all war armament and munitions, that consumption has about overtaken production, and even with the great stimulus the present price gives, the price is confidently expected to remain high for much of the coming year at least.

Oregon is just entering the copper list this year. The matte shipments from the Sumpter and the Taklima smelters constituted the first copper tonnage of moment sent from the state. As the first output of first-class matte, and even with the great stimulus the present price gives, the price is confidently expected to remain high for much of the coming year at least.

The oil has a commercial value of \$2.00 per barrel, crude, at the well. This field being directly upon the water front, with good harbor facilities, and a thousand miles nearer the orient than any port in the states, will control the Oriental oil trade. Something like eight million dollars in refined oil products were consumed in the orient last year.

Oil refineries are also contemplated for Portland, and the several oil refineries now operating in California will also be in the market for these goods.

BONANZA ORE FOUND.

Strike in Richmond Group, Adjoining the Big Bonanza Mine, at Geiser.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., Dec. 19.—A promising ore body in the Richmond mine has been reported by telephone to Nat Cooper by Al Stearns, who has been doing assessment work on the Richmond group at Geiser. This group adjoins the big Bonanza mine and is a spur of the Bonanza vein. Stearns says that he broke into a vein of rich ore which is nine feet wide between walls, and is the continuation of the old Bonanza. The ore has been sampled and found to be identical in character with the Bonanza as found in the old workings of that property.

P. Basche of the Basche-Sage Hardware company in this city runs the group. His friends are rejoiced at his good fortune, as he has for many years been helpful to the miners, often at the expense of his private interests.

FINLAND JOYOUS OVER HER RESTORED LIBERTY

(Journal Special Service.) Helsinki, Finland, Dec. 20.—The Finnish diet was reopened here today. The population is highly enthusiastic over the overthrow of the tyrannical yoke of the Russians and the restoration of Finland's ancient rights and freedom. The dictatorship has been abolished, the manifesto of February 15, 1899, has been annulled and the status existing in Finland before the Russian government began to curtail the freedom of the nation has been restored. Enormous throngs surrounded the parliament building, where the diet met, all day and everywhere the people manifested their joy over the national emancipation of Finland.

THEIR WEDDING JOURNEY A TRIP TO NORTH POLE

Cincinnati, Ohio, Dec. 20.—Max Fleischmann, a brother of Mayor Julius Fleischmann, and Miss Sherlock of this city were married today in the presence of a large number of their friends. The couple will have one of the most peculiar and interesting wedding trips ever enjoyed by a bridal couple. Mr. Fleischmann has chartered the Norwegian vessel Laura and has engaged an experienced crew, that has twice sailed the Arctic waters and, accompanied by his bride, will cruise in the Arctic sea, trying to get as near the north pole as possible.

Municipal Bonds Not Taxable.

Olympia, Wash., Dec. 20.—The attorney-general has issued an opinion wherein he holds that municipal bonds are exempt from taxation, and while the question was not presented, he holds inferentially that warrants must be obtained in the same category. This opinion conflicts with a ruling of the state tax commission that bonds and warrants must be taxed. Bankers are opposed to taxing their securities on the ground that it would cause investment funds to be withdrawn from the state.

U. S. GOVERNMENT REPORT ON OUR OIL

(Bulletin 225, U. S. Geo. Sur. 370.)

There is no other coal with which it is likely to come into general competition, or with which it can be compared, for it is far higher in heating power, and better in purity than any coal that is mined upon the Pacific coast, either in the United States, Canada or Australia."

WET TICKET WINS 2 TO 1 IN ASHLAND ELECTION

G. S. Butler Is Chosen Mayor and M. F. Eggleston Recorder—Will License Saloons.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Ashland, Or., Dec. 20.—An exciting and hotly contested city election was held in Ashland yesterday. The conservative or "wet" ticket was victorious, electing their mayor, G. S. Butler, by a majority of more than 2 to 1, and their candidate for recorder, Captain M. F. Eggleston, carried every ward, having a total majority of 85 over Berry, the candidate of the Anti-Saloon league. The vote on wet and dry proposition resulted in a majority of 25 for the wets. The dry ticket elected one councilman in the second ward and one councilman in the third ward. The total vote cast today was 715.

Excepting the year 1903 Ashland has been dry for five years and continuously in agitation over saloon licenses for 10 years. Conservatives celebrated the victory by fireworks and horns last night.

INDEPENDENCE VOTES FOR NEW WATER SYSTEM


Special Election Shows Big Majority Favoring Municipal Ownership Project.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Independence, Or., Dec. 20.—By a vote of two to one this city yesterday declared in favor of establishing and maintaining a gravity water system. While those opposing the city owning its own water plant did hard hustling the last few days, the final vote shows the sentiment of the town was strongly against them. The agitation for the city ownership of the water plant began about nine months ago, and last summer the city council had a preliminary survey and estimate made and last month ordered a special election, that the people might have a chance of voicing their sentiments, which resulted in the overwhelming vote in favor of city ownership.

The cost of the proposed plant will be in the neighborhood of \$25,000, the city to issue bonds to cover the full amount. The intended source of supply are springs situated on the east side of the Willamette river, about three miles from the city. The water is of excellent quality. A reservoir will be built about two and one half miles from the city at an elevation of 175 feet above Main street. The capacity of the proposed reservoir will be 350,000 gallons. The carrying capacity of the pipe while used for fire protection will be about 125 gallons a minute. When the reservoir is filled this will keep three 1-inch fire nozzles going for ten hours at a pressure head of 100 feet. The system will be supplied with 20 fire hydrants. The distributing system will consist of six and one eighth miles of street water mains. The water will be delivered to the consumers at a pressure head of 165 feet. The network of pipe covers practically the whole improved portion of the city.

In paying for the proposed plant bonds are to be issued and a sinking fund created, the surplus revenue each year to go into the sinking fund to pay for bonds at time of maturity.
