EGGS STRIKE 30 CENTS TODAY
Market Continues to Break With Heavier Receipts and Smaller Demand.

TURKEYS HOLD FIRM AT TOP QUOTATIONS
Best Dressed Meats in Active Call With Slight Advance in Hogs—Two Cars Very Fancy Oranges Arrive During the Day.

FRONT STREET, Dec. 22.—The principal features of the Portland wholesale markets today are: Chickens continue to glut. Turkeys firm at the price. Best market for hogs. Two cars very fancy oranges arrive during the day.

As has been told for The Journal for more than a half week, various prices have been asked by dealers in eggs. The first signs of a break occurred when the street changed its quotations to range between 34 and 35c. Formerly everything went at 30c. Today a considerable number of sales were made as low as 30c and some as high as 31c.

Receipts continue to increase in the chicken market despite the heavy shipments sent out by the Journal and the trade. The selling of chickens is very weak and some dealers have been made as low as 10c for mixed crops, while others are showing a downward trend.

While it cannot be said that there has been any real shortage of turkeys in the market for the Christmas trade, the volume of demand is larger by a single drop than the demand warranted at the price. Today there continues a very good trade in turkeys and the volume of demand is 21,000 for dressed stocks, with the latter price the more general.

Demand for dressed meats of best grade was very good during the day, and the volume of fancy hogs were reported as high as 7 1/2c a pound. Receipts in both dressed hogs and veal were very small, considering the season.

There continues a scarcity in fresh Columbia river apples. The market is very tight during the day. Tomatoes are in market and find a good call. Claims of all kinds were scarce during the day, but the volume of demand was very good.

Wheat and flour have a holiday character and both markets are unchanged. Barley, oats and other millfeeds, except hay, were in demand. There is practically no business reported in potatoes and onions.
