Brewer's Daughter After an Escapade Will Wed in Her Father's House.

TRIED TO ELOPE BUT FAILED IN ATTEMPT

Daughter of Adolphus Busch, the St. Louis Brewer, Will Marry German Hop Dealer—Father Says He Does Not Care.

St. Louis, Dec. 28.—Theodore Scharrer, aged 25 years, a wealthy hop dealer of Stuttgart, Germany, it was announced today, will marry Wilhelmina Busch, daughter of Adolphus Busch, at the latter's house on New Year's day.

Adolphus Busch says he does not know of the contemplated marriage and doesn't care. He says the registration at Belleville was of Scharrer's German fiancee, a woman, Scharrer says the wedding will be at his home.

The affair has created a great stir in leading social circles of St. Louis. The bride's father is reputed to be worth \$10,000,000.

The strike of the hens has been declared off and already most of the workers have returned to their tasks. The output of eggs has in the past week or so shown a considerable increase, and this has been accompanied by a decrease in prices.

It is not already tired of turkeys, it will soon be ready to welcome the turkey. For the New Year's trade there are but scant supplies of these birds and prices are even higher than those ruling for Christmas.

For over a week the public has neglected the hen in the markets and prices therefore tumbled. Now there is a resumption of the demand and prices have advanced back to the old figures.

Never were ducks and geese so scarce as these days. The early coming of the Chinese New Year has caused the shippers to hold back their supplies, for at that time the quotations generally again about a third over their ordinary ruling.

Among the retail butchers a resolution has been adopted asking the city to appoint a meat inspector under the ordinance passed by the council several months ago.

The memory of onions selling in this market at 10 cents a pound is still green in the minds of the housewives, and there are some fears that the price again will become unruly toward the latter part of the season.
