GEORGE KOSTER DECLARES FIGHT WAS FIXED

Santa Rosa Sports Sore Over Accusation Made Against Fight Principals.

(Journal Special Service.) Santa Rosa, Cal., Dec. 29.—George Koster, a San Francisco pugilist, who was knocked out by James Hornbuckle of this city in the second round of a 25-round bout, has written a letter to the public in which he alleges the fight was "fixed" with Hornbuckle.

Hornbuckle had agreed to "lay down" to Koster for an even division of the purse. The defeat of Koster after about a minute's fighting in the second round and the fact that the betting on the result of the fight had changed suddenly, caused many at the ringside to claim the fight had been fixed.

Those who lost money in betting on the "mill" are particularly sore, and one victim called on Mayor John P. Overton the afternoon of the fight and, stating to him that the fight had been fixed, asked that the public be protected. In answer to Koster's accusations Hornbuckle has posted \$500 as a forfeit on a bet of \$1,000 for a return fight with Koster.

Koster, in declaring the fight a fake, said he was anxious to meet Hornbuckle again. Hornbuckle's proposition is to throw the doors of the Alhambra open to the public and permit all who want to see the fight to enter free. He has faith in his ability to give Koster all he wants at any stage of the fighting game.

He leaves besides a widow four sons and two daughters: James Stamper of Athens, Nelson Stamper of Idaho, Henry Stamper of Weston, Jesse Stamper of Idaho; Mrs. James Brown of Pendleton and Mrs. Andrew Raney of Lexington. The funeral was held in this city today.
