

TODAY'S MARKETS TURKEY SUPPLIES VERY SCANT

Receipts Never So Small This Time of the Year—Prices Are High.

VARIOUS PRICES NOW RULE IN EGG MARKET

A Few Hop Sales Reported of Prime Grade Around Ten Cents—Choice Goods Being Held for Advance—Celery Lower With Large Stocks.

Front Street, Dec. 30.—The principal features of the Portland wholesale markets today are: Turkey supplies too small. Receipts never so small this time of the year. Prices are high.

Not in the history of the local market has there been such a scarcity of turkeys along the coast. The volume of arrivals for the Christmas trade was considerably smaller than the demand warranted and prices moved up considerably.

Various prices are ruling in the egg market today. Receipts are very light and are still increasing. Along the coast the best hatch stock is quoted as low as 25 cents, with 20 cents as the top.

But a few hop sales were reported during the past few days, and these were for small amounts. Ten cents is the best price reported for the eastern markets as well as those in Europe.

Recent orange arrivals are showing better color, prices today for fancy rolling between \$2.75 and \$3.00, with \$2.50 as the low end.

There is considerable weakness shown in celery today and prices are lower. Some sales of fancy stalks are reported as low as \$3, but \$2.25 is the very top.

Easier Cables at the Opening Caused Rush of Selling But as There Were Plenty of Buyers the Offerings Slacked Off.

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TERMINAL PEDESTAL AND GRAD Residents on Raleigh Street Fighting Effort of Northern Pacific to Get Highway.

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SAY PROPERTY SHOULD BE FOR PUBLIC TRAFFIC

Many Are Compelled to Use This Thoroughfare in Reaching Depot and Its Improvement is Being Urged.

At the next meeting of the city council a petition will be presented by J. Couch Flinders asking for the vacation of Raleigh street from Twelfth to Front street, a distance of nearly two blocks. It is said to be the desire of the petitioner to secure the vacation of the ground for the purpose of including it in the terminal yards of the Northern Pacific railway, which owns the adjacent property.

J. Couch Flinders appeared before the street committee of the city council yesterday and asked that the proceedings for the improvement of Raleigh street be held in abeyance by the city council until after the vacation proceeding has been started. He said that it would be useless to improve a portion of the street and charge the cost to the property owners if it was to be immediately vacated. The proceedings had been started and the committee could not stop them. Mr. Flinders decided to present his petition for vacation at the next council meeting.

Residents on Raleigh street have been trying for months to have the thoroughfare improved. It is one of the main arteries leading to the depot and if the street is vacated where desired it is said that many property owners will be greatly inconvenienced. At the same time it is said that it will turn travel, which now goes down Raleigh street, to Sawyer street. About three months ago property owners were instrumental in getting the old streetcar rails in the street removed and proceedings for a gravel improvement started. The contract for the improvement has not been let and the thoroughfare is in a deplorable condition.

When J. Couch Flinders asked for a delay in the improvement yesterday W. M. Davis, a property owner on the thoroughfare, objected on the ground that it was an immediate necessity that the street should be improved. He said that property owners on the street would never consent to the vacation as proposed.

"We will never permit this street to be vacated if we can prevent it," said Davis today. "Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets are already closed and Raleigh street is now the only avenue by which many of the residents reach the depot."

The charter also provides that whenever a street is vacated the ground reverts to the adjacent property. The property adjacent to the portion of Raleigh street belonging to the railway company, and the ground would revert to the company for nothing. This land is valuable. They could not purchase it in the open market for \$50,000, yet they desire it to be given them for nothing.

"We people in that neighborhood will be on hand to make a determined protest against any action the council may take to vacate the property, because it will work a hardship on us; besides it will be giving away the streets which belong to the city."
