POTATO CROP OF COAST LARGE

Production of Past Season in Oregon, Washington and California Increased.

YIELD IN UNITED STATES IS SMALLER

Colorado Is Shorter and California and Oregon Ship More to Arizona and Texas Than Previously—Lower Prices Here Due to Fine Quality.

Front Street, Jan. 21.—The principal feature of the Portland wholesale market today is the coast potato crop is larger.

The final report of the department of agriculture on the potato crop has been announced.

While a year ago only a few potatoes were shipped to the Pacific coast states by Colorado and Utah, practically all stocks are coming from the West.

The value range is between 2 1/2 and 3 1/2 cents per pound.

Another vessel was added to the fleet in the harbor last night by the arrival of the British ship Haddon Hall.

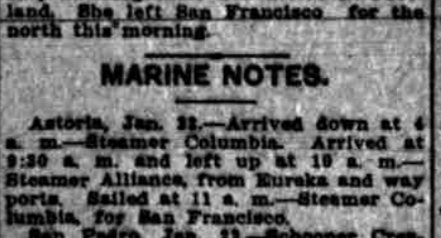
