PLAN TO ASK STATE AID FOR INSTITUTION

Experiments With Open Air Treatment for Consumption Indicate That Climate Is Favorable to Treatment of Disease.

When the members of the state board of health and other Portland men who are personally interested in the open air sanitarium, situated on the bluffs overlooking the Willamette river, opposite Elk Island, several miles above Milwaukie, visited that institution this morning.

The object of the visit on the part of the state officials was to glean an insight into the management of the hospital by Miss Catherine McManis.

The institution is only partially self-supporting. The patients, both men and women, pay \$10 a week for their treatment.
