rederation of Miners, arrested in Denver Saturday night, charged with complicity in the assassisation of ex-Governor Steunenberg, reached Boise at \$10 o'clock this morning. Adjutant-General Wells of Colorado, Deputy Warden, Mills of Idaho and three Pinkerton detectives guarded the prisoners en routs. No stops were made at any town between Denver and Boise, all the engines being changed at sidings, where there was no station, and the water taken at secluded water tanks. The arrest of Haywood, Moyer and Petithone was enly made public when it was learned that they intended leaving Denver. Orchard is said to have confessed that he attempted to murder Governor Steumenberg last Christman night, using a shotgun, but refrained, as other members of the family were in range at the time. He told where he hid the gun and cartridges, which were later found by the officers in the place assassinated the judges of the supreme court of Colorado, but the bomb did not explode. The bomb was found at the place where Orchard to religion, and made a full confession, including the crime committed at-Independence, Colorado, blowing up the depot, the murder of Mine Superintendent Collins at Telluride, blowing up the Indicator mine shaft at Cripple Creek and killing three men.

The publication of the facts in The Journal of yesterday has excited considerable discussion among attorneys as to the legal questions involved, but they are generally agreed that the fine must be paid. Section 3466 of the revised statutes of the United Btates is in part as follows:

"Whenever any person indebted to the United Btates is insolvent or whenever the estate of any deceased debtor, in the hands of the executor or administrators, is insufficient to pay all the debts due from the deceased, the debts due to the United States shall be first satisfied."

The only question that can arise is whether be not the fine imposed upon Senator Mitchell is a debt within the meaning of this statute. If so, it will take precedence over all other claims against the estate. Thomas G. Greene, who is attorney for the administrator of Senator Mitchell's estate, is investigating this question. As yet he declines to express any opinion in the matter, further than to say that no precise precedent for the present case has been found in any of the federal decisions.

According to the report of the appraisars, the value of Senator Mitchell's estate is \$3.767.54. As some of the assets have realized a trifle more than their appraised valuation, the estate may yield a total of about \$4,000. The debts of the estate aggregate about \$10,000. If the government's claim is to be mitsfied in advance of all others, it will leave about \$3,000 with which to pay the expenses of administration and all remaining creditors.

Whether or not the fine is pald out of the estate will make no pecuniary difference to the heirs of Senator Mitchell's death carried would receive nothing from his estate. Emperor Franz Joseph Dissolves Hungarian Parliament With Great Display of Military Force.

**ABSOLUTE REGIME NOW** GOVERNS HUNGARY

Expected Disorder in Dissolving of Legislative Body Fails to Materialise-Dissolution Marks Culmination of Quarrel Between Crown and Coalition Leaders.

Budapest, Feb. 19.—The Hungarian parliament was dissolved today by order of Emperor Franz Josef with a great display of military force, but little disturbance. Hungary will now be governed by an absolute regime similar to that prevailing after the fallure of the revolution of 1848. The dissolution marks the culmination of the lond standing quarrel betwen the crown and the coalition leaders of the Hungarian parliament over the recognition of Hungary's rights to liberty. Today's proceedings are a turning point in the destinies of the dual monarchy of Austria-Hungary and may lead to revolution, ending in the establishment of Hungary's independence.

From 1866, when Austria was excluded from the German confederation, the policy of the emperor has been framed to regain for the Hapsburgs the supremacy and the German imperial crown.
