REFORMERS WILL AID COUNCIL

Local Option Organization Takes Hand in St. Johns Saloon Fight.

ANCIENT, UNSIGNED LAW TO BE BROUGHT FORTH

Ordinance Without Date of Passage or Official Signature May Have Bearing on Situation—Councilmen Rest on Oars.

Another wheel inside of the whirling maelstrom that marks the St. Johns saloon situation has commenced to buzz, and it is likely that the new vehicle of wrath will cause confusion in an already badly strained machine. The latest element of grief is the activity of the local option forces, not only of the town, but of Portland and the state.

It has recently come to light that the general attorney of the local option forces has been investigating the various ordinances passed by the St. Johns council on the saloon question, as well as the provisions of the town charter which bear on the subject. The report of the attorney for the temperance people is said to have influenced the councilmen in their change of attitude last Monday night when the license recently granted to the St. Johns Hotel company was revoked and the license money ordered returned to the company when its bar should be closed.

Now that the council has apparently done all it can to close the saloon, and has failed, the temperance people are taking up the fight and it is probable that suits will be instituted looking toward the closing of the saloon. If the town had \$1,000 to offer the saloon management for its license, and so could live up to the letter of the resolution revoking the license, it is thought the case of the temperance people would be stronger, but the council cannot lay hands on the amount, nor half of it, and it is entirely probable that the sum will be raised by the state local option organization and loaned to the town long enough for the tender to be made for the return of the license; an offer which would be entirely safe, as the management has openly taken the stand that it will not give up its permit merely because the council asks it to.

There is one anchor of hope for the temperance forces that will soon be tested. Ordinance No. 14 forever restrains the council from granting a liquor license in St. Johns, or anyone from selling liquor in the town. The ordinance unfortunately has no date of passage signed to it, no name of mayor, recorder or councilman appears on its face, and there is nothing either in the ordinance or the records of the council to show that the measure was ever passed, or even considered.

It is contended on one hand that the ordinance passed and was not duly recorded through an oversight, and on the other that the ordinance never came before the council and was probably passed in the book of records by some reformer who wanted to secure action from the council on the measure, but never did. There can be found in the town a dozen witnesses who will take their oath on each side of the question. The last year has brought out so many ordinances, resolutions, motions and recinding orders that any trial of the case would be tangled, complex and decided with difficulty.

Though it was probably not the intention of the council to give an exclusive monopoly to any saloon, this is what has resulted from the recent resolutions for the council has defeated a general license ordinance, and so will keep out all other saloons, at the same time endeavoring to revoke a license without being in a position to enforce the closing order.

BUTTONS FOR EAST SIDE.

Sixty Thousand People May Be Adorned With Association Badges.

It has been proposed by one of the leading members of the East Side Improvement association that every man, woman and child living across the Willamette, or interested in the growth of the district, be tagged, labeled and so marked that every less fortunate resident of the city will become envious and anxious to join the East Side Improvement as the only place to settle. A considerable number of the members of the association are not prone to the walking billboard idea on general principles, but the advantages of tagging and labeling of East Portland with some emblem that will be attractive and that in a phrase will tell the merits of the territory are so numerous that individual dislike may be overcome and the entire 60,000 or more eastsiders blossom out in new bloom.

While doing things for themselves, the members of the association are also doing things for the residents of every suburb on the east side and are now beginning a campaign of advertising that will be constantly broadened until its scope is similar to that of the Commercial club and board of trade. Already capitalists have been generally informed of the advantages the east side offers a department store and theatre. The people of the state have been told of the new east side depot and its advantages through advertisements placed in the country papers and the local people have been kept aware of the organization's work through the reports in the local press. It is now proposed by a button scheme, or some similar plan, to bring the lesson home to every one who gets inside the city limits by continued repetition and to this end buttons, billboards, dress waists and electric signs may all be pressed into service.

Two Conferences Will Support Paper to Be Known as North Pacific Advocate.

The organization of the North Pacific Conference of Seventh Day Adventists was completed yesterday morning, and in the afternoon the South Pacific conference finished its work and adjourned after a joint meeting with the delegates of the north conference. W. B. White, formerly president of the union conference, was chosen head of the North Pacific conference. A. J. Breed was made vice-president. E. Cady of Walla Walla was chosen an educational secretary and J. J. Ireland an auditor. It was decided to divide equally the \$6,000 in the treasury.

The northern conference will take over the control of the Mount Tabor sanitarium and the two conferences will support a paper which will be known as the North Pacific Advocate and will be the organ of the church on the coast and in Hawaii, Alaska and the provinces.
