Frankie Neil, pugilist, was arrested on a charge of manslaughter for the death of Harry Tenny in a boxing ring. Neil was taken to the hospital and is expected to recover.

REDUCE WATER AND GAS

San Francisco, March 1.—The board of supervisors has reduced the rates of water to house consumers to 10 cents per 100 gallons and the price of gas at 5 cents per 1,000 feet.

WILL TAKE 6,000 TONS OF FLOUR TO VLADIVOSTOK
