Provision Market is Advanced.

Higher and scarcer hogs have again contributed to an advance in the provision market. Today the United Meat company announced a rise in various lines. The advances are: Picnic hams, 5¢; hams, 2¢; shoulders, 1¢; lard of both grades, 1¢. The changes take effect today.

California Butters Arrives Today.

The first shipment of butter of any size this season came on the steamer which was unloaded this morning. The local creamery business is showing signs of activity and is anticipated a lower range of values. Generally expected that prices will stay where they are the present week.

Steelsheet Salmon is Advanced.

Prices of the salmon market have at last returned to the conditions in this city and the price of steelsheet is up to a pound today. Supplies very light. Receipts in other lines in fish market are quite rare. Prices otherwise unchanged.
