### Compromise Virtually Agreed Upon Over Moroccan Problems by Algierias Conference Today.

## GERMANY BACKS DOWN FOR UNITED EUROPE

### France Makes Concession on State Bank of Morocco and Germany on Policing of the Country, Which Will Be Done by France Under Supervision of the Powers.

(Journal Special Service.) Paris, March 10.—A peaceful outcome of the Moroccan problem is virtually assured today, when questions regarding the establishment of a state bank of Morocco and the policing of the country, the main problems on which Germany and France disagreed, were practically settled today to the satisfaction of both nations.

It is expected that the formal convention will be signed next Tuesday and the conference adjourned. France has made concessions on the state bank question, which will be controlled by France, Germany, England and Spain jointly. France is willing also that the neutral powers will have supervision over the French police force to be used in Morocco.

German delegates, upon instructions from Berlin, modified their uncompromising attitude in order to avoid trouble with united Europe, as the powers virtually all declared in favor of the French position. Russia is said to have notified the German officers that the case would have to protect Germany in case of a war with France.

Great Britain, Italy and Austria, as well as Spain, sided with the republic. Even Portugal, as well as the minor kingdoms of western Europe, notified Germany that she could expect no aid from them in the event of a conflict with France.

### H. C. DYE IS ARRESTED FOR IOWA OFFICERS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Walla Walla, Wash., March 10.—H. Claude Dye of Seattle, employed on the work of exporting the city books here, was arrested late last night by Sheriff Painter on instructions from Sheriff Smith of King county, who stated that Dye was wanted at Sidney, Iowa, for forgery. Dye was locked up in the county jail and will be held until officers arrive from Iowa. Dye is understood to have been employed as teller in a Sidney bank in 1902. No details of the alleged crime have been furnished the Walla Walla officers.

# BOYCOTT HURTING FLOUR TRADE

### Wheat Growers and Millers of California Affected by Hostility of Chinese.

## PRICE OF CEREAL IS STEADILY DECLINING

### Shipments to Orient Cut in Half Despite Fact That Trade With Japan and the Philippines Has Been Doubled.

(Journal Special Service.) Stockton, Cal., March 10.—The Chinese boycott against American goods is hitting the wheat growers of this section, the stockton flour mills and those engaged in river transportation. The price of flour has been cut 10 cents a barrel this week. The price of milling wheat has been declining steadily for some time. There is practically no trading, and there has been none of any consequence for several weeks. Mill owners do like the Chinese boycott, and hold it responsible for this condition.

## CENTRALIA LUMBERMEN GO OUT ON A STRIKE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Centralia, Wash., March 10.—Twelve men employed at the Salsar Valley Lumber company's plant went on a strike yesterday demanding higher wages, taking the stand that as the price of lumber had advanced they were entitled to a raise, and if their demands are not acceded to they will make it a general strike, including other mills, giving the company until March 14 to decide. Common laborers are now receiving \$1.75 a day and demand \$2. Manager Gilchrist says that he anticipates no serious trouble and will take a firm stand on the basis of present wages. He says that he can get all the men needed.

### Found Dead on Railroad Track.

(Journal Special Service.) Marengo, Ill., March 10.—A young man was found dead on the railroad track here today. The only clue to his identity is a photograph of a girl, on which was inscribed "Wealth of love, Vannie Miller, Grand Encampment, Wyoming."

# COURT MAY NAME PHYSICIANS

### Judge Frazer's Decision Directly Opposite United States Supreme Court's.

## TEN STATE SUPREME COURTS WITH JUDGE

### To Get Fair Expert Testimony, Judge Frazer Declares, Examination by Unbiased Physicians, Appointed by Court, May Be Necessary.

Presiding Judge Arthur L. Frazer this morning handed down a decision directly opposite one rendered by the United States supreme court some time ago, holding that the court can appoint physicians to examine into the extent and causes of the alleged injuries received by persons as the alleged result of street car accidents or negligence.

"As the matter stands, the authorities being so divided, the court feels free in this case," declared Judge Frazer. "There is nothing so sacred about the person of one who has sued for damages as to give cause for that plaintiff not to submit to an examination; if the plaintiff's arm has been injured, I cannot see why it should not be examined by a physician other than those employed by the injured person; the same is true regarding any other part of the body. Expert testimony offered by physicians in such cases as these differs decidedly, those employed by one side favoring that party while those employed by the other side favor their employers."

### Suddenly Stricken With Acute Attack of Inflammatory Rheumatism.

## MAY BE CONFINED TO HIS ROOM FOR WEEKS

### Close Attention to Onerous Duties and Attendance on Special Night Sessions Thought to Be Cause of Breakdown.

Mayor Lane was stricken with an attack of inflammatory rheumatism while at the banquet of the Unitarian club last night and today he is confined to his room in great pain. His right leg is drawn out of shape at the ankle and his muscles are contracted into large knots. His condition is said to be quite serious and it may be several days or even weeks before he will be able to return to his office.

After the banquet of the city executive board yesterday afternoon, which did not adjourn until 8 o'clock, he responded to an invitation to attend the banquet of the Unitarian club. He was feeling as well as usual. While sitting at the banquet-table his right foot became numb and when he attempted to move it was seized with sharp pains in the member. He remained while the after-dinner speeches were being given and also made a short speech, although suffering intensely.

After the banquet had ended he attempted to walk, but had to be assisted onto the street, and was compelled to call a carriage and be taken to private apartments, not being able to return to his home.

### BISMARCK'S OPPONENT IS DEAD IN BERLIN

(Journal Special Service.) Berlin, March 10.—Eugene Richter, Radical leader of the reichstag, Bismarck's old opponent, died this morning. He was born in Dusseldorf July 24, 1824, and educated at Dusseldorf, Bonn and Heidelberg. His father was a well-known physician. He was elected to the reichstag in 1867 and has since been leader of the German Freisinnige party. He was the author of several political works.

## NEW ARCTIC EXPEDITION TO START FOR NORTH

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vancouver, B. C., March 10.—Captain Mikkleson, formerly of the Danish navy in Vancouver, will head a polar expedition that will outfit and sail from Vancouver. Funds for the expedition are mainly supplied by the Duchess of Bedford, who is an enthusiast on polar researches, and Sir Robert Markham, president of the Royal Geographical society. The expedition will go under the auspices of the Royal society and American Geographical society. It will cost \$25,000 to outfit the expedition, which will start about April 1.

(Continued From Page One.) become incompetent or refuse to act, then the remaining trustees, or a majority of them, shall appoint another or other suitable person or persons, and thereupon such new trustee or trustees shall become and be invested with all the rights, privileges and estates, including the appointment of new trustees, and subject to all the duties and obligations as if originally named as trustees in this my will. And I hereby give and grant to said trustees full power and authority to make such rules and regulations for the government of said institute and admission of applicants thereto not inconsistent with the purpose thereof, as herein expressed, as to them or a majority of them shall seem proper, with power in their discretion to incorporate said institute in the name herein designated under the laws of the state of Oregon, providing for the incorporation of religious, benevolent and charitable societies, if and whenever the incorporation thereof shall tend to the better perpetuation thereof, and the promotion of the objects for which this bequest is made. Provided, that no compensation shall be demanded or received by any trustee hereunder, nor by any other of such corporation.

having obeyed jurisdiction and settled the question of residence, the California courts were bound by their decision. The court reviewed the proceeding in the Oregon courts at some length. He laid special stress upon the decision of the district court and the present appeal to the Oregon supreme court. While basing his decision on the right of the court the judge intimated that the facts presented would force him to the same conclusion had the court had the original jurisdiction. He held that the testimony showed that the interests of the Reeds was in Oregon and that perfect sympathy between husband and wife over the disposition of their property existed—that the residence of Mrs. Reed with Pasadena relatives was in a sense temporary, although her residence was purchased—that the whole life of Mrs. Reed was such that her real interests in life centered among her old friends and that the founding of an art institute was settled before the death of her husband, who relied upon his wife to carry it into effect.
