

# RAILROAD SOON TO COPPER MINES

Guggenheim and Havemeyer Interests Projecting Four-Hundred-Mile Line.

## ENORMOUS SMELTER NEAR SAN FRANCISCO

Smelter People, Says L. C. Dillman, Are Building Steamers Which Will Do Nothing but Carry Alaskan Ores From Valdez.

L. C. Dillman of the Alaska Amalgamated Copper company of Portland, who is stopping at the Portland hotel, in receipt of information that the first expedition sent out by the company to its copper properties in the heart of Alaska reached its destination on March 28, making the trip from Valdez in 12 days.

"In less than two years from now we will have a railroad running almost to our properties," continued Mr. Dillman. "It is being built by the Guggenheims and Havemeyer interests. It will be about 400 miles long. Already 80 miles have been graded. The road starts from Valdez, follows the Lowe river to the Tekeli river, following the bank to the Copper, along which it runs to the mouth of the Chitina, and up that river to the Bonanza property, which Guggenheim and Havemeyer are heavily interested in. The road will pass close to the claims owned by the Portland company.

"For the treatment of the ore to be taken from the Bonanza and other copper mines in Alaska, including our own, the Guggenheims, or smaller trust, are erecting the largest smelter in the world near San Francisco. Furnaces are being put in for the treatment of 1,000 tons per day when that amount of ore is received.

"Smelter people are building a line of steamers which will do nothing but carry Alaskan ores from Valdez. It is expected that they will be ready for business by the time the smelter is completed and the mines sufficiently opened up to have ore at Valdez.

"Our properties, and those of the Guggenheims and Havemeyers are in the richest copper belt in the world. The ore is of unusually high grade. There is a sufficient amount of copper in that section of Alaska to supply the world were every other copper mine closed down. We made our wonderful discoveries while prospecting for placer gold. At the time we did not appreciate the magnitude of the deposits. But a careful investigation has proved to our satisfaction that we own some of the greatest copper properties in the world. Their city and harbor rapidly as possible. Our ore will be treated at the new San Francisco smelter."

## ROYAL WELCOME FOR PRINCE AT VANCOUVER

(Journal Special Service.)  
Vancouver, B. C., March 31.—Right royal was the welcome to Prince Arthur of Connaught today, when he and his suite reached the city on the steamship "Princess Victoria." The city and harbor were astir early. Immense crowds assembled along the water front, and rounds of cheers mingled with the national anthem and salutes from the harbor ships and land batteries as the steamship came up the harbor. Visits were exchanged between the prince and the civic, naval and military authorities. The Sixth regiment formed an escort of honor. After the formalities of greeting had been disposed of the royal visitor and his party were taken on a drive through Stanley park and to points of interest in and about the city. The main feature of the entertainment program takes place in the drill hall this evening, when his royal highness will inspect the Sixth regiment and be presented with a civic address of welcome.

The prince will leave the city early tomorrow morning for the east by special train over the Canadian Pacific railway, and will stop off at various points, including Banff, to enjoy the scenic splendors of the Rockies before paying brief visits to Calgary, Regina and Winnipeg.
