

WES HER VICTIM TO ESCAPE JAIL

Woman Who Made Living Advertising for Husbands Proves Clever Defendant.

PREVENTS TESTIMONY BY HAVING REAL CEREMONY

Mrs. Martha Odell Represented That She Had Eighty Thousand Dollars and Induced Willing Swains to Invest With Her.

(Journal Special Service.) Oakland, Cal., April 4.—Mrs. Martha E. Odell, with offices on Kearney street, San Francisco, whose principal business is advertising for husbands, an advertisement that she is worth \$80,000, and inducing them to invest in mining properties in Amador county, of hypothetical value, proved herself a clever defendant by marrying W. W. Henderson, one of the alleged victims, to prevent his testifying against her on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses proffered by John A. Horn, late of Nebraska, who got caught in the matrimonial net.

BURGLAR FATALLY SHOT BY SPOKANE DETECTIVE

Spokane, Wash., April 4.—Detective Robert Briley last night shot and fatally wounded Edward Donnelly, a burglar, who was at work on a safe in the Spokane cloak and suit house, owned by Simon Beltrichack. A passerby saw him in the store and telephoned the police. A back window was broken. Briley leaped over the sash, and saw the man but 16 feet away. He ordered "hands up" but the man crouched. At the second order the burglar put his hands behind him. Briley then fired and Donnelly fell to the floor and lay writhing in pain.

OAKLAND CARMEN VOTE TO ACCEPT AGREEMENT

Oakland, Cal., April 4.—At 3 o'clock this morning the carmen's union unanimously adopted the final agreement reached yesterday between union leaders and the Oakland Traction company, thus avoiding the threatened strike. The result is only a partial victory for the men, the main point gained being recognition of the union and a hearing for discharged employes, together with minor concessions. The demand for an increase in wages was not granted. The present wage scale will remain in force until January, 1907.

(Continued from Page One.) offered opposition to the movement, she said. But she immediately modified her statement by declaring that there were only five, for one of the opposing sheets had expired in the past week.

A General Discussion.

In the absence of other reports and aroused by the interest created in Mrs. Boyer's remarks, there was general discussion of the most effective way to obtain space in newspapers. In the course of the discussion there were few women in attendance who failed to speak. Miss Kate Gordon of New Orleans expressed the belief that personal efforts with the editor would prove an efficacious means, while Miss Gail Laughlin, the barrister of the equal suffragist contingent, thought that results would be accomplished if the editor were shown the business advisability of printing suffrage news.

Subjunctive Sixty Years.

Among the other speakers was Mrs. Knapp of Hood River, who declared that she had been a suffragist for 50 years, and during a time when many persons thought it doubtful to be considered a "strong-minded woman."

He pretended that he was to receive a large sum of money from America, and supported his story with a fraudulent cablegram. On the strength of his story he borrowed money right and left, including his prospective bride-in-law, and then skipped. A warrant is out for his arrest.

Threatens Those Who Have Assumed Charge at Zion City With Criminal Prosecution.

NEW APPOINTEE SEEKS ADVICE ON PROCEDURE

Deposed Prophet Will Fight His Enemies and Is Coming Back From Mexico Threatening Vengeance on One-Time Friends.

SCULPTOR IN AIRSHIP IS CRUISING THE SKIES

Last Seen of Paul Nocquet He Is Being Carried Out to Sea by Strong Breeze.

New York, April 4.—Swinging along on the breast of a strong easterly wind, Paul Nocquet, sculptor and aeronaut, who made the ascension from the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Harlem river at 8 o'clock last night, was carried across Long Island sound to Long Island and thence straight down over the island, and the last seen of him was just as darkness fell, 1,000 feet above the earth, passing over Hickeyville, rapidly discharging ballast and rising higher in his flight. At midnight no further news had been heard from him. It is possible that he landed somewhere in the Long Island marshes, but more probable, judging from the course the balloon was taking that he spent the night in the clouds.
