

KILLS WRONG MAN IN QUARREL

Andrew Jackson of Baker City Slays Warren H. Mathews in Fit of Anger.

BULLET INTENDED FOR BROTHER OF MURDERER

Assailant Returns and Gives Himself Up After a Spectacular Chase Through the Hills, Pursued by the Sheriff and Posse.

 Baker City, Or., April 8.—In a fit of anger, caused by a quarrel over division of land, Andrew Jackson last night deliberately shot and instantly killed his brother-in-law, Warren H. Mathews. Immediately after the deed the murderer escaped to the mountains on horseback, pursued by Deputy Sheriff Snow and posse. After a spectacular chase along the hills, which was witnessed by the people of Baker City, Jackson returned to the city and surrendered to Chief of Police Jackson.
 Jackson had been quarrelling with his brother, Carey Jackson, and suddenly jerked out a revolver and pulled the trigger, but the gun snapped. Mathews then stepped in front of the infuriated man, when the latter deliberately shot him in the temple, killing him instantly.
 The Jacksons—five brothers and two sisters—have lately divided up their father's estate, a tract of land lying between Baker and South Baker, where the Jackson brothers run a dairy. Andrew Jackson had been grading his lots and those of his sister, Mrs. Endicott, and constructing an irrigation ditch, which ran through the center of one of the lots.
 Yesterday, Carey Jackson and his brother-in-law, Warren Mathews, told Andrew Jackson that he must stop work on the ditch. He replied that he would not, as he was acting as his sister's hired man. After some words they left the field and Jackson hurried to the house and armed himself with a revolver. At 8 o'clock last night Carey Jackson and Mathews returned to the field armed with clubs, so Mrs. Endicott averted, and attacked Jackson, who drew his revolver and the murder ensued.
 It is believed that Jackson is demented, as there is insanity in the family. His mother was confined in the insane asylum and his brother went insane four years ago and committed suicide.
 The coroner's jury this morning brought in a verdict as follows: The deceased, W. A. Mathews, came to his death from a gunshot wound inflicted at the hands of W. A. Jackson, April 6, 1904, at Baker City, Oregon.
 An information charging Jackson with murder will be filed this afternoon.

CHARGED WITH MURDER IN THE FIRST DEGREE

Spokane, Wash., April 8.—Mrs. Josephine Baruth, who recently shot her husband at Medical Lake, was yesterday bound over to the superior court on a charge of murder in the first degree. Baruth died last Friday.
 Mrs. Baruth was first held on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, but the prosecuting attorney yesterday moved to dismiss all minor charges and the first degree murder charge was filed.
 The prisoner was committed for trial and brought to the county jail in this city last night. Her attorneys will apply for bail. A sensation was caused by witnesses testifying to a statement by Mrs. Baruth that her husband had tried to ruin their 10-year-old daughter. Some of the witnesses believe the woman was furnished the revolver by an outside party.

WENAHA RESERVE REALLOTMENT

Entire Area to Be Reapportioned at Meeting to Be Held at Walla Walla.

COMPLAINT OF OREGON SHEPHERDERS THE CAUSE

Sensors Fulton and Gearin Did Much to Secure Redivision—It Is Charged Washington Owners Were Favored Over Oregon Men.

 Pendleton, Or., April 8.—Dan P. Smythe, secretary of the Umatilla Woolgrowers' association, states that he has been informed that the entire Wenaha reserve is to be reallocated at the meeting to be held in Walla Walla April 11. Stockmen wishing to secure range may earnestly make no applications or use those presented when the original allotment was made.
 For weeks the officers of the Umatilla Woolgrowers' association have worked earnestly to secure a redivision and it is mostly through the assistance of Senators Fulton and Gearin at Washington that the reallocation was ordered. Also the influence of Governor Chamberlain was brought to bear in the matter.
 The complaint of the Oregon sheepmen was that they were not given their share of the reserve when it was divided. Though over half of the reserve and the most desirable part is in Oregon, only 25,740 Oregon sheep were admitted, whereas 121,300 Washington sheep were allowed. Of the latter number 87,250 were allowed on the Oregon part of the reserve, thus placing 12,000 more Washington sheep in Oregon than there were Oregon sheep for the entire reserve. Not a single Oregon sheepman was allotted land in Washington. By the unjust division 33,728 Oregon sheep which had previously ranged in the reserve were denied summer pasture, much to the injury of the owners.
 As the matter of summer range is a vital one to sheepmen, the Oregon men were hard hit by the unjust allotment. For some time it seemed doubtful if they could get it, but they have worked hard and persistently, with the above result.
 On April 11 the Umatilla county sheepmen will meet here for the purpose of discussing subjects relating to the Wenaha reserve.
 WASHINGTON'S QUARTERS OFFERED FOR SALE

 Paterson, N. J., April 8.—The old day mansion, at Lower Preckness, Passaic county, which was the headquarters of Washington when the continental army was stationed at Paterson, was put up for sale by the sheriff today, together with some 80 acres of land comprising the estate. The property was purchased from the Indians by Thomas Hart of Enfield, Middlesex, England, the deed being still on record in the court-house in this city. In 1717 the heirs of Hart conveyed a tract of six acres to Dirrick Day, who built the present house. The last owner of the place was ex-Mayor William H. Belcher of Paterson, and the property came into the sheriff's hands owing to Mr. Belcher's financial difficulties and flight from the city.

Walla Walla Pioneer Dies.
 Walla Walla, Wash., April 8.—George Starret, a pioneer resident of Walla Walla, died suddenly at his farm south of the city yesterday afternoon of heart disease. Mr. Starret came to Walla Walla in the early seventies and for years engaged in the seed business. He was a native of Pennsylvania and leaves a widow and one son, who succeeded him in the wholesale seed and nursery business.

MUCH MACHINERY FOR MINES NEAR GRANTS PASS

Biggest High Pressure Pump Ever Made to Be Used in Hydraulic Operations.

 Grants Pass, Or., April 8.—Two carloads of machinery have arrived here for the Golden Drift Mining company and consists of equipment to be added to the big power and hydraulic raising plant of this company in the Dry Diggins, near Grants Pass. Ten more turbines and two additional pumps will be placed. The pump now employed has a capacity of 15,000 gallons daily, or 1,600 gallons per minute, delivered through two three-inch monitors under a pressure of 140 pounds to the square inch. This is said to be the largest high-pressure pump ever manufactured. The two pumps that will be added are of the same type as that now employed, but will have a slightly less capacity. The combined capacity of the three pumps will be close to 40,000 gallons daily. A portion of this will be lifted into ditches and used for irrigating purposes.
 Manager M. C. Ament of the Golden Drift company states that the entire spring and summer will be required to make the changes now contemplated at the power dam and in the Dry Diggins placers. Besides the installation of the turbines and pumps, the tailrace will be widened and deepened, and for this purpose a large dredge is being built by the company.
 When the improvements and additions are complete a battery of three or four giants will be operated and, besides supplying these with all needed water and pressure, there will also be an abundance of bywater for the sluices. Another line of 22-inch steel pipe will be built from the power dam to the diggins to convey the water from the pumps. The pumps are of the five-step centrifugal type, and weigh 35 tons each. Twelve hundred horsepower is required to operate each one. The dam develops a total of 8,000 horsepower.
