ABOUT THE HOME.

The time is almost here when the refrigerator will be one of the most important features in the home. Nothing adds so much to the comfort and convenience of the family during the warm weather and nothing calls for such unceasing vigilance if it is to be a source of health and not of illness.

Griddle and spread each cake with jelly as soon as taken up.

Light Griddle Cakes.—Sift one and one half cupfuls of pastry flour with two level teaspoonfuls of baking powder.

Corn Meal Griddle Cakes.—Put one cup of yellow corn meal into a bowl with a level teaspoonful of salt and two level teaspoonfuls of sugar.

Buckwheat Cakes.—Into a wide-mouthed pitcher put two cups of buckwheat flour, one half cupful of corn meal, one half yeast cake dissolved in one half cup of lukewarm water.

White Corn Griddle Cakes.—Mix three cupfuls of white corn meal with one cupful of flour, one quart of milk, one quarter of a yeast cake dissolved in one quarter cupful of lukewarm water.

Sour Milk Griddle Cakes.—Stir enough sifted pastry flour into one pint of sour milk to make a drop batter.

Bread Griddle Cakes.—Grate enough dry stale bread to fill one cup, add one cupful of milk and let stand 30 minutes, then beat, add a saltspoonful of salt.
