ST. JOHNS COUNCIL IN TONIGHT

City Starts on Another Administration Era This Evening—To Make Plans.

MARSHAL, ENGINEER AND ATTORNEY TO BE NAMED

Division of Sentiment No Longer Exists Regarding Official Attitude Towards Saloons and Improvement Plans to Be Given Attention.

Tonight the old St. Johns council will formally deliver the town government to the recently elected officers, the work of the year will be closed, the new officers will be sworn in and plans made for the future.

It is expected that Mayor-elect Fred Valentine will tonight name not only the standing committees of the council but the marshal, city engineer and town attorney. Charles Broderick is at present marshal. City Attorney Greene will probably be again appointed and it is probable that the present city engineer will continue in office.

Recorder-elect Thorndyke, one of the editors of the St. Johns Review, will, in addition to his place as recorder, hold that of police judge and justice of the

peace, opening his first session of court tomorrow morning. During the last six months the illness of Recorder Hanks has left the town without a regular recorder.

Minutes of the council have been signed by Recorder Hanks, Deputy Recorder O. E. Learned, Deputy Recorder O. R. Downs, Deputy Recorder Thorndyke and Thorndyke recorder pro tem. In the last few months and the result has been that the town's official business is considerably involved. There is some question regarding the salary to be paid the recorder and police judge, the former's wage being \$40 a month, but the charter allowing the city to pay up to \$100 a month for the service. Mr. Thorndyke, to provide with the town charter, expects to sell his interest in the Review and to secure an adequate salary.

The officers who will tonight take their seats are from mayor to last councilman candidates of the Citizens ticket and are for the most part business men who have property investments in the town and who are thoroughly acquainted with the past political trials of the place and the disadvantages the outgoing council has labored under owing to a division of sentiment regarding the saloon question. The incoming council is united for high license, and its general policy is announced to be of improvement. Though the financial affairs of the town are in much better shape than they were a year ago, the need for economy is pressing owing to a low tax levy and a number of outstanding warrants and other debts.

Mayor W. H. King is the only member of the present council who will continue in office, he being one of the new councilmen. Fred Valentine, mayor-elect, for the past year has been city treasurer.

IS METROPOLITAN NOW.

New Grillroom Makes St. Johns People Proud Than Red Nose Cart Did.

St. Johns has assumed new metropolitan airs with the opening of a grillroom. The management of the St. Johns hotel, which recently completed a \$10,000 two-story brick block in the business center of the town, yesterday admitted the public to a cafe, after spending six months in decorating the rooms, arranging the cuisine and securing a cook. It was the promise of the company when it secured its license from the council that the establishment would compare favorably with any similar place in Portland, and when the grill was later added to the original plans of the company the same idea was carried out.

Up to this time, St. Johns has been content with lunch counters and hotel meals served "family style," but when the inhabitants tackled the first course dinner served by home talent yesterday they knew a new era had dawned. Today the town is putting on more airs than it did when the horse cart arrived. The new grill presents a menu card

that is as complete as that of the pretentious city establishments, and from waiter in full dress to cut glass and linen the appointments of a metropolitan place have been given.

EAST SIDE NOTES.

Bids have been asked for the construction of a schoolhouse at Estacada to cost not more than \$5,000. Bids will close April 14.

Tonight, under the auspices of the Montavilla Improvement association, a musicale, followed by the play, "Trial by Jury," will be given at Woodward's hall, in the suburb.

The first livery stable ever conducted in St. Johns will soon be started by Cochrane Brothers, in the old Poff & Covey building, now the property of the Star-Brewing company.

After meeting 10 Portland bowling teams the Montavilla organization closed second in the tournament, and the members are nightly haunting their home alley to get into such trim that next time they can go to the very top. Just as the Estacada council was ready to close a deal for the purchase of the town water plant from the present owners, a petition signed by a large number of the taxpayers was presented opposing the purchase of the system at the agreed price and asking that the voters be given a chance to determine whether the plant should be bought and at what price, if it was decided to secure it. The deal is off and an election will determine the question.

Elected at Lostine. Lostine, Or., April 9.—In the Lostine city election the following officers were elected for the ensuing term: J. H. Haun, mayor; Charles Melquist and George Hunter, councilmen; K. W. McKenzie, treasurer; O. F. Mays, recorder; Robert Davis, marshal.

NEW SHORT LINES TO SOUTHWEST

Railroad to City of Mexico From Chicago and One From Denver to the Gulf.

PLANS FOR DEVELOPMENT OF IMMENSE ARID REGION

B. F. Yoakum Syndicate to Spend Seventy Millions—Shortens Distance Several Hundred Miles—Rock Island to Control.

(Journal Special Service.) Chicago, April 9.—With two big railroad deals just completed toward establishing a new through short line from the Great Lakes to Mexico City, and a system of lines which shall bring Denver in touch with the gulf, and the Gulf territory in touch with the orient through Pacific ports, it comes to light that the B. F. Yoakum syndicate is about to accomplish one of the really great railway achievements of recent years.

The whole plan is part of an enterprise to develop the southwest, and in its execution the Rock Island and St. Louis & San Francisco systems are involved in a vital way. To date the project has involved the expenditure of \$20,000,000 and the ultimate cost will be close to \$70,000,000.

The Chicago-Mexico City line will reduce the traveling distance between these two cities more than 600 miles. There will, in fact, be two lines between the lakes and the Mexican capital, one by the way of St. Louis, New Orleans, Galveston and Brownsville, the other via Kansas City, Fort Worth, Brownsville and the National of Mexico. Yoakum syndicate lines into touch with all the gulf ports, as well as all of the St. Louis & San Francisco, Eastern Illinois and Rock Island lines into touch with the same ports, and with old Mexico. When these plans are completed the Yoakum lines probably will come into control of the Rock Island, giving it the most comprehensive system of railroads in this country.

WASCO SOCIALISTS HOLD HARMONIOUS MEETING

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., April 9.—The Socialist convention for Wasco county met Saturday in the city hall and adjourned that evening, after adopting certain resolutions. The meeting was called to order by the county chairman, L. L. McCartney, and C. E. Barzee was elected permanent chairman.

Resolutions were adopted accepting the national and state platforms as passed at their recent conventions and pledging allegiance to the international Socialist movement, endorsing the effort the women of Oregon are putting forth "to throw off the yoke of bondage imposed upon their sex by our antediluvian ancestors—that they be accorded the full rights of twentieth century citizenship"; condemning the "ridiculous and admitted illegal extradition of the Western Federation officers in the Colorado-Idaho affair, and demanding just and fair play in their trial"; endorsing "the Roseburg Spokesman, a paper of Coos (Douglas) county, one which has given us a column for Socialist news and propaganda," and the Chronicle of this city, for "the recent and present Socialist discussion permitted."

CRUISER WASHINGTON OFF FOR TRIAL TRIP

(Journal Special Service.) Washington, April 9.—The armored cruiser Washington has left Newport News for her official trial trip, which takes place this week on the Rockland (Maine) course. The Washington and her sister ship, the Tennessee, are the two most powerful vessels of their type on this side of the Atlantic and the navy department is much interested in the showing that will be made by the Washington on her trial trip. The Washington was constructed by the New York Shipbuilding company at Camden, New Jersey, and is the first big war vessel to be built by that firm. Her length on water line is 527 feet; breadth at load water line, 75 feet 10 1/2 inches; displacement, 14,500 tons; maximum draught on trial displacement, 25 feet;
