**PORTLAND BOY'S FATHER PAYS DUTY ON GOODS**

C. E. Brownlee, Who Was Chief Inspector of the Department of Concessions at the Fair, Avoids Trouble for His Son.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Seattle, Wash., April 12.—John P. Merrill, commander of the Oregon, made a request of Deputy Collector of Customs Mitten last night that custom officers make a search of the Oregon to see if there were any dutiable goods aboard. Upon receiving the request, Mitten detailed a squad of men to make a search. This will be done this afternoon. No attempt was made yesterday to search the vessel. Yesterday government officials stated that no attempt would be made to search the Oregon but that all packages sent ashore would be followed, searched and their

owners confronted with a request for an explanation.

"Sure we had lots of stuff," said a big weather-tanned Jack Tar when discussing the matter yesterday. "Why, all the boys were buying right and left with all the money they could get hold of. Those that had no money traded the shirts off their backs and some even parted with their sweaters.

"How much did we have? Oh, that's pretty hard to tell. I had about \$75 worth, but others did not have money enough to procure as much as I did. Many of the boys had from \$15 to \$30 worth. Most of this stuff went ashore at San Francisco. If the customs officers search us they won't find very much."

C. E. Brownlee, who was chief inspector of the department of concessions at the Lewis and Clark exposition, and who has a son aboard the Oregon, stated yesterday that he would pay duty on \$75 worth of goods brought over by his son rather than have any trouble with the authorities.

**PLACE LOST CAPTAIN'S DAUGHTERS IN ACADEMY**

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Aberdeen, Wash., April 12.—The two daughters of Captain Hank have been placed in St. Rose's academy, through the generosity of friends, headed by Captain A. T. Stream and Robert Durney. A little more than a year ago the Surf Duck, the little boat owned by their father, Captain Hank, was blown out to sea during a terrific gale and its crew has since never been seen. The family was left unprovided for, and has since resided in Hoquiam in destitute circumstances. Captain Stream raised \$175 here yesterday, and no difficulty is expected in raising the sum of \$330 that is required.
