lieutenant in the army and except for extraordinary promotion the most he could hope for at the opening of the gpanish war was retirement as a major. He was promoted to the rank of major of engineers in the volunteers and assigned to General Merritt's di-vision for service in the Philippines. He went out in the second expedition of troops in July, 1898, and almost imme-diately was made chief of intelligence.

Transferred to MacArthur's command, he became scout master. He picked out about 20 men and they covered the en-tire country in front of MacArthur's lines. He had been wounded in the first day's fighting around Manila, when the insurrection began, but he did not let that bother or interrupt him, and was in the field again in a week or less. Shouted and Shot.

In the summer of 1899 the lieutenant-In the summer of 1899 the lieutenant-colonelcy of a volunteer regiment was offered him, but he declined it. Soon afterward he obtained permission to organise a regiment from among the time-expired volunteers who were then due to return to the United States. He got the men who would keep shouting and shooting, and presently began to demonstrate the correctness of his theory that that was all that was needed to go anywhere in the islands. In the general forward movement of the fall of 1899 he operated on the left of Mac-Arthur's line, and the usual thing was for him to report at night that he had centured the town he had been sant to reconnoiter.

He was made a brigadier of volum teers and put in command of a northern district, with headquarters at Dagupan


