

24 PEGS TO KILL BUT 15 HOLES

Legislative Candidates Discover Their Dilemma and Are Very Sad.

MATTHEWS AND SIMON BUSY WITH SLATE

Patched-Up Machine Will Endeavor to Run Down All Who Favor People's Choice for Senator but Is Likely.

Merry war is waging among the so-called "independent" republican candidates for the legislature in Multnomah county. There are two dozen of them, with only 15 places to fill on the legislative ticket, and the prospect is worrying them. Who are to be slated for the nominations?

At least 11 of the "independents" are counting upon the support of ex-Senator Joseph Simon and the rumor is current that the Simon ticket will be sprung on the morning of primary day and that a strong effort will then be made to line up for it all the strength of the old Simon organization. The Simon ticket is known to be working quietly but earnestly in behalf of certain of the candidates and in opposition to those who have subscribed to statement No. 1. The Oregonian also has its eye on the matter.

Notably the fight waged is against Jonathan Bourque. In reality it is against statement No. 1, and a desperate effort is being made to accomplish the defeat of every candidate who appears on the ballot as unequivocally pledged to the people's choice for senator. Some of the "independent" candidates who have been used in this fight are awakening to the fact that they are looked upon by the trio of slate makers as mere food for powder, and they are displaying anything but a lamblike indifference to the prospect of certain slaughter in the primaries. This spirit of revolt displayed itself last Saturday night when the Republican club of which Max Cohen is one of the leading spirits met for the purpose of endorsing a legislative ticket.

Slate Was Sold Alike.

The tip had gone out that the club was to endorse a slate of candidates and the result was an unexpectedly large attendance of friends of candidates who had reason to expect that they would be left off the slate. In consequence, they were forced to abandon for the time at least the idea of endorsing any of the legislative candidates, though it is possible that another attempt to do this may be made tomorrow evening when the executive committee meets again.

Among the 24 "independent" candidates are several who are more or less pronounced adherents of the principle of popular election of United States senators, though there are none who appear on the ballot as pledged to statement No. 1. With one or two exceptions they are not likely to receive support from the slate-makers.

Swallow Colwell Easily.

E. B. Colwell, candidate for state senator, has received the endorsement of the Oregonian in spite of his record of weakness and incapacity in the last session of the legislature. An additional charge of disorderly conduct was entered against one man and the woman. This is the worst record for drunkenness in a twelvemonth.
