(Journal Special Service.) San Francisco, April 15.—Two subjects have drawn the attention of the followers of the squared circle these days. One is the series of battles which McCarey has succeeded in arranging at Los Angeles between the stars of the light division, and the other is the reports which are being made to coax Jim Jeffries back into the ring. All sorts of reports are current in regard to this latter subject. One of them is to the effect that the San Francisco fight trust has offered the big fellow \$100,000 for a series of fights. This report actually has been received with credence in some quarters. It may, however, be as "hot air" superheated. The fight trust is not doing business for fun, nor is it giving out real money unless there is a reasonable certainty of its coming back with some increment. There is no series of fights which could be arranged for Jeff which would bring in \$100,000, to say nothing of what would go to the loser, the expense money and the increment.

As I have said before, all this talk about Jeff fighting again is without foundation. He is happy and contented on his farm. He has money enough and his farm is paying. He will not fight for anything in sight or likely to be.

THREE FIGHTS SCHEDULED

The three battles at Los Angeles are now close at hand.
