Oregon Relief Committee There
Has Concluded Work of
Assisting Refugees.

FUNSTON GETS SUPPLIES
SENT IN THE FUTURE

Conference Held in Bay City It
Is Decided to Let Civic and Mil-
itary Authorities Deal With the
Situation Hereafter.

The Oregon relief bureau at Oakland,
California, was closed this afternoon.
The committee there having completed
its work. All additional relief supplies
sent from here will go directly to Gen-
eral Frederick Funston, who will have
personal charge of the distribution of
them.

The Oregon bureau, according to
all reports from Oakland and San Fran-
cisco, has accomplished a great work
in providing for the sufferers.

The relief committee here worked
through the bureau at Oakland, sending
many carloads of provisions and
thousands of dollars in cash to the
sufferers. The amount of work done by
the bureau cannot be estimated until
those in charge of it and the committee
here have an opportunity to wind up
their business affairs and make a re-
port showing in detail what has been
accomplished.

The closing of the bureau at this time
was done upon the advice of Joseph N.
Teal, chief of the bureau at Oakland,
and General Funston.

Two Hundred Debris Bunkers to
Be Erected in Various Parts
of San Francisco.

San Francisco, May 5.—Captain E. B.
