Merchants to Use Them in Decorating for Made in Oregon Fair.

## PLANS COMPLETED FOR THE CARNIVAL

Additional Features Secured for Industrial Parade—Fire Department Will Give Realistic Exhibition, Drill for the Pleasure of City's Guests.

Decorating for "Made in Oregon" week has commenced. The first pieces of bunting were hung on the breeze this morning by the Commercial club. A force of decorators were put to work early in the morning at the temporary home of the club on Alder street. When the members reached the rooms for the noon luncheon they found the windows draped in green and white—the colors of the "Made in Oregon" movement—and festoons of bunting of the same colors hung on the front of the building. It is expected that by tomorrow general decorating will commence and several large business houses have elaborate plans for ornamenting.

Additional features are being added each day to the program for the week. The fire entertainment at the Armory on Tuesday night promises to be a monster event. T. B. Wilcox will preside and a number of prominent citizens will act as vice-presidents. Addresses will be made and a number of well-known vocalists of the city have offered their services. The various theatres of the city will contribute their quota to the entertainment by providing vaudeville acts.

A feature of the week will be the exhibition by the fire department. In addition to taking part in the parade on Friday the department, under the direction of Chief Campbell, will give a fire drill on one of the principal streets of the city Thursday evening. It is probable that arrangements will be made to have the drill illuminated by a series of search lights. A fire company will come tearing down the street at high speed. The engines will be attached to hydrants, the extension ladder will be run up and the firemen will give a thrilling demonstration of fighting a fire. Part of the drill will include the scaling of a tall building with pomper ladders.

Another float that promises to be unique will be added to the parade. The Italian Association of Vegetable Gardeners has arranged to display the products of their model vegetable garden. In addition to this float the association will also have in line a number of decorated wagons.

At the meeting of the joint committee last evening resolutions were adopted asking citizens and visitors to the city to favor with their patronage the merchants who have contributed window space to the exhibition.

# TARIFF REVISION HIS PLATFORM

Charles V. Galloway Making Campaign for Congress on This Issue.

# HIS DECLARATION IS MISREPRESENTED

His Friends Charge That His Opponent Quotes Only a Part of the Tariff Platform and Uses It Against Galloway in Campaign.

Charles V. Galloway, Democratic candidate for congress from the first district, is making his campaign largely on the grounds that he will vote for a just and equitable revision of the tariff laws. In his platform he declares: "If elected to congress I shall vote at every opportunity to reduce tariff rates and schedules that grant protection to special interests, and rates and schedules that by prohibiting imports decrease national revenue."

According to the Cloverdale Courier, an independent newspaper, Mr. Galloway's opponent, Rev. W. C. Hawley, in his Tillamook county speech made a glaring and unjust representation of Mr. Galloway's position. The Courier says: "He began by misrepresenting his opponent, Mr. Galloway's position on the tariff. He read from Mr. Galloway's platform as follows: 'If elected to congress I shall vote at every opportunity to reduce tariff rates and schedules that grant protection to special interests, and rates and schedules that by prohibiting imports decrease national revenue.'"

In Mr. Hawley's Yamhill county speech he refrained from making any such misrepresentations and spoke in the highest terms of the Democratic candidate in his home county. In McMinnville Mr. Hawley lent all his energies to an endeavor to arouse a partisan spirit and said he was opposed to Mr. Galloway "because he is a Democrat."

# SPEAKERS ADDRESS MUNICIPAL LEAGUE

Colonel Robert A. Miller and Hon. J. D. Matlock were the principal speakers at the meeting of the Municipal league in Hilberian hall last night. Colonel Miller said that in several Oregon cities

the municipal ownership of the water system has been found to be successful and the practicability of the movement established. He said there are so many problems involved in municipal ownership that care should always be exercised in its extension. Mr. Matlock said he had given considerable study to the problem and had letters from the officers of 150 cities where municipal ownership of lighting and water systems have been successfully operated. He cited numerous instances where city governments are furnishing light and water at smaller prices than are charged by private concerns and are yet paying a profit into the treasury. Speeches were also made by Francis Clarno, Isaac Swett, William Horan and A. P. Nelson, all of whom are candidates on the Democratic legislative ticket.
