Oregon Students Were Splendidly Prepared for Yesterday's Track Meet.

Trainer Haywards' Work Highly Commended

The splendid showing made by the University of Oregon athletes in the dual meet yesterday with the Oregon Agricultural college teams at Eugene reflects the highest credit on the sincere work accomplished at the state institution by Trainer Bill Haywards and the young men under his direction.

An effort is being made by the officers of the Portland Kennel club to have all entries in as soon as possible. The entries close on May 22, and for the convenience of those wishing to enter dog secretary Watkins will keep his office open from 7 to 9 on Monday and Tuesday evenings.

Oscar Graham Was Easy Mark for the Hard Bunting Giants.

EIGHTEEN SAFES WERE LOCALS' SHARE OF HITS

Garvin Was Invincible in the Box and Only Three of Visitors Managed to Solve the Problem of His Elusive Curves.

Between showers yesterday the Giants managed to give the Oaklanders a good hard drubbing and the few fans who had the courage to sit out the night and one half dismal innings, more than got their money's worth, so far as batting and base-running were concerned.

The Giants, very early in the game, took a liking to Oscar Graham's offerings and sent them all over the rain-soaked field. In the first inning McLean slammed out a triple and beat it home on Kruger's error that gave the Giants to register.

Garvin scored in the fifth on his hit and a good drive by McLean. In the eighth inning Graham was put to rout with a drive of hits, seven in number, two misuses and poor judgment, with the result that four more Giants crossed the home plate.

Oakland's runs came in the seventh and ninth innings. Blise, Alt and Markley's double scored the first and three more hits sent the second run home in the last chance.

The match was loosely played, the patched-up condition of the Oakland team contributing to the disaster. Garvin struck out 10 Commuters and helped matters along by connecting safely three times out of five times up. The official score:

STUDENTS REFUSE TO PLAY RUGBY

California and Stanford Committees Agree Not to Engage in English Game.

REPRESENTATIVES FAVOR DUAL TRACK MEETING

Suspension of Football Means That Expenses for Track, Rowing, Baseball and Other Athletics Will Be Lost to Student Bodies.

(Journal Special-Service.) Stanford University, May 19.—R. W. Barrett, treasurer of the Stanford student body, held a conference with California members of the intercollegiate athletic committee yesterday and as a result there will be probably no intercollegiate football between the University of California and Stanford.

The commission, consisting of R. W. Barrett, E. P. Stott and D. D. Saleh of Stanford and O. F. Suedigard, Graduate Manager-elect, Ezra Decoto and Everett Brown of California, were strongly in favor of doing away with football if the old game could not be played.

They all favored a full track meet instead of the football game. The rowing matches and third intercollegiate baseball game which were made impossible this spring by the earthquake, may be held in the fall.

All the varsity men declare their intention of not coming out to play Rugby, and it is thought that both student bodies would support the above plan. The student bodies of both universities have been financially injured by the omission of the spring athletic meets, and new money is needed to pay the expenses of coaching and training.

Unaware of the conference at Berkeley, James F. Lanagan, varsity football and baseball coach at Stanford, has left for Vancouver, British Columbia, where he expects to study Rugby football during the summer with the Canadian enthusiasts.

Jimmy Lanagan passed through Portland on Thursday en route to Vancouver, British Columbia. When here he was not aware that any action would be taken during his absence. What the outcome will be is eagerly awaited by friends of Stanford and Berkeley.

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TRACK MEN UPSET AT PACIFIC

Action of Committee in Suspending Ball Players Causes General Turmoil.

FLETCHER RESIGNS AS CAPTAIN OF TRACK TEAM

Sentiment of Student Body Has Not Been Expressed in Matter—Inclement Weather Caused Postponement of Meet With Willamette.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pacific University, Forest Grove, May 19.—Athletics are in a great turmoil at Pacific university. Both baseball and track are in a general mix-up on account of the action of the athletic committee in suspending Sparks, Huston, Drake and Ward from athletic events.

The track team is divided and Captain Fletcher, who was the instigator of the suspensions, has resigned permanently from the captaincy of the track team because some of the leading athletes criticized his stand in regard to the suspending of the baseball men.

The track men met at the gym last night and were totally surprised by Mr. Fletcher's hasty action. No new captain has been elected, but the general expression seems to favor Peterson, Pacific's star athlete. He captained last year's team and has the sympathy of all his fellows, so that all the men will pull together from now on. He is in favor of Huston, and will enter him in the Salem meet provided the latter is reinstated by the new athletic committee.

Contrary to reports published yesterday morning there has been no expression of the student body, but the general feeling seems to condemn the action of the athletic committee which took radical action on a comparatively trivial matter.
