Sturdy Grammar School Lads Win the Y. M. C. A. Relay Contest.

LADD BOYS FINISHED STRONG SECOND IN RACE

Match Started at Oregon City and Covered a Distance of Thirteen Miles, Which Were Made in Remarkably Good Time.

Event—Y. M. C. A. grammar school relay race. Distance—13 miles. Time 1 hour, 21 minutes 34.5 seconds.

Winners—North Central school team first, Ladd school second, Atkinson third. The first relay race ever held by the grammar school students of Portland was run yesterday from Oregon City to this city, a distance of 13 miles. The event was won by the North Central lads, who ran a remarkably good race, considering the poor condition of the roads, made muddy by showers during the entire morning.

The contest was held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., L. M. Meyers originating and carrying through to a successful finish the prize-worthwhile feat. A large crowd assembled in front of the Y. M. C. A. building on Fourth street and cheered the weary runners as they came in. As the start was not made promptly on time, the spectators' interest increased as the time for the finish grew close, and as Fred Barber of North Central crossed the tape a winner, in remarkably good time, the clever youngster was heartily cheered. One of the best runs was made by George Burns of the same school, who was compelled to run two miles, the eleventh and twelfth, making each a winning one. The one boy who ran the greatest distance was Laird Ashby of Thompson school. This hardy young man ran seven miles and finished fifth. This performance is worth more than passing notice and ranks Ashby as one of the best runners in the city.

TRACACREPTIVS TRACK MEET

First Interscholastic Field Event Proves Successful Affair.

HAROLD REED IS STAR OF THE BIG MEETING

Splendid Marks Made by Local Academicians Portland Makes More Points Than All of Her Competitors Combined.

Before a crowd of about 400 interested spectators Portland academy won the first interscholastic field and track meet ever held in the city on Multnomah field yesterday afternoon. The athletes wearing P. A.'s white and orange won more points than all the other schools together could gather to their credit and the most resulted in P. A. gaining a total of 58 points, Columbia university 25, Portland High school 16, Hill Military academy 13 and Allen's Preparatory school 0.

The star performers of the day were Reed and Schwartz of Portland academy, who gained 15 and 13 points respectively by their own personal efforts for their school. Out of a total of 13 events Portland academy won 10 first places, Columbia university 2 and Hill Military academy 1.

The meet was the first of its kind ever held in Portland between the local preparatory schools and academies, but it was carried out by the participating athletes with such vim and vigor and watched by the spectators with such interest that it bids fair hereafter to equal, if not outshine, even football and promises to become the most important interscholastic athletic event in the area of the different events were as follows in the order of their winning:
