AH FAT, ARISTOCRATIC CHINESE, FACES THE COLD, COLD WORLD

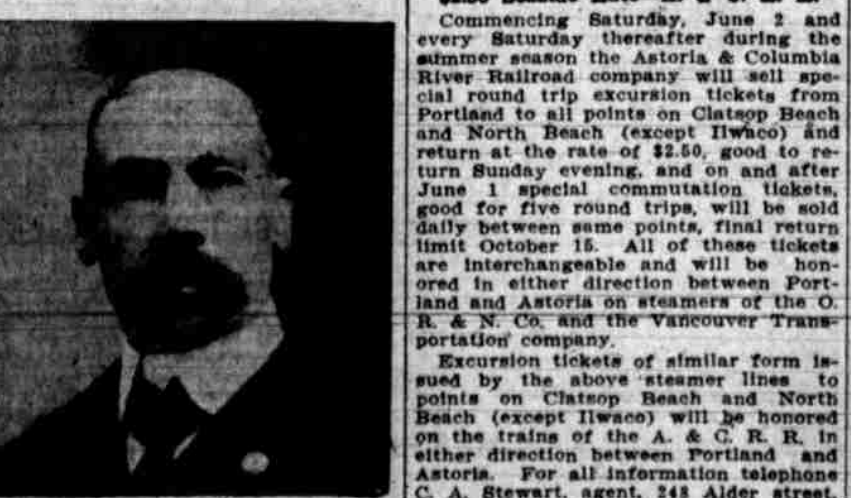
