The Commuters deserved to win yesterday afternoon's game from the Giants. The wind was very busy from the first ball pitched until McCredie fouled out to Devereaux in the last half of the ninth, playing baseball every minute and taking advantage of every mistake made by Portland.

The Oakland players, stung by the 11 to 0 shutout in the morning, donned their war paint and set out to win. The first two innings were unproductive of results. Alvin Markley, Markley had been disposed of Van Haltren singled and stole second and a second later stole third. Francks was safe on Eslick's slight fumble and Van Haltren slid over the home base by an eyelash. Francks pilfered second and Kruger came up and slammed out a double, scoring the shortstop, but "Oom" Paul was caught at the third switch while trying to extend his drive into a triple.
