STATE TROOPS CAN BUY BURTON RESIGNS POSITION AS U. S. SENATOR

War Department Charged Al- After Conference With Governor Hoch of Kansas He Anticipates Colleagues.

Burton of Kansas today resigned his position in the senate of the United States United States army can be manufac-tured in Oregon and purchased by the military cheaper than it can be secured. military cheaper than it can be secured.

This has been demonstrated by a recent contract enteredinto by Adjutant-General Finzer of the Oregon National guard, whereby a dozen regulation army targets are to be made for the use of the guard in target practice by the firm of Charles Moshberger & Sons of Woodburn, at a cost of \$25 cach. The same atyle of target cannot be purchased from the war department for less than \$45 each.

These targets are what are known as after a conference with Governor Hoch. Senator Burton was indicted for ac-cepting a bribe from a concern which cepting a bribe from a concern which was fraudulently using the United States mails. He was convicted. The course adopted by the discredited senator was forced upon him. Had he not resigned his colleagues would have declared his seaf vacant.

The senator was very prominent in the affairs of the Republican party, having spoken in every campaign since 1875. He has appeared in political canvases from Maine to Colorado. He is 55 years of age, a native of Indians.

These targets are what are known as "sliding targets." They are made in two sizes. The 6 by 6 targets are used for all ranges between 100 and 600 yards, and the 12 by 12 for all ranges from 800 yards to 1,000. They are all wood with the exception of a few rods, boits and pulley wheels, and all of these latter attachments are cast at the foundry at Woodburn also. The first of the new targets was finished last week and it was erected and tested at Woodburn Saturday by Adjutant-General Finzer and proved satisfactory and fully up to the standard of the government targets in all particulars.

Of the 12 targets ordered, which must be paid for out of the funds of the state military organizations, one has been put up at Woodburn and the others will be erected at Portland, Salem and other stations in the state where the troops hold their meetings and target practice. CONGRESS PASSES MEASURE VANCOUVER CARS TO RUI PROPOSED IN PORTLAND

CLAIMS PART OF FOR

Acts Favorably on Bill Outlined by Members of Local Chamber of Commerce.

Congress today passed a bill creating a United States district court in China. along lines recommended some months ago by the Portland chamber merce. The trustees of the chamber needed, to do away with evils existing in the administration of maritime laws and international complications under the present consular service.

In November, 1905, the trustees add a resolution asking for "establishment of a district or federal court in the orient, with extra territorial jurisdiction for the administration of justice among Americans, either resident there or trading in those countries." The court trading in those countries." The court will have the hearing and adjudication of cases arising between mercantile and shipping men and sailors who are citizens of the United States or under the American flag. In the past many cases have arisen involving legal questions with which the ordinary consults unfamiliar, and which require consideration by a court having full judicial powers and functions to deal with contending American interests. So far as known the Portland chamber of commerce has no special preference in the personnel of the proposed court. No one has been mentioned for the place, but it is supposed a Pacific coast man who is familiar with conditions here and in the orient will be appointed.
