Missing Sellwood Girl Located and Returned to Her Home—Physicians Will Be Asked to Examine Into Her Condition

After a 16-hour search, Bessie Bauer, the Sellwood girl who has twice thrilled Portland by mysteriously losing herself, was found near the old rock crusher in Riverview cemetery at 10 o'clock this morning by J. A. Fields of Fulton.

Fields started out to look for the missing girl this morning and as he passed over a ridge near the rock crusher he caught a glimpse of her. She had seen him first and crouched behind an old fence to avoid being seen.

STATE TROOPS CAN BUY AT LOWER FIGURE

War Department Charged Almost Twice as Much for Rifle Targets.

Equipment such as is used by the United States army can be manufactured in Oregon and purchased by the military cheaper than it can be secured, or is secured, by the war department under contract.

Targets are what are known as "wild" targets. They are made in two sizes. The 8 by 8 targets are used for all ranges between 100 and 400 yards, and the 12 by 12 for all ranges from 800 yards to 1,000.
