TRAINS ON LEWISTON-RIPARIA LINE BRANCH

Engineer Harry A. Brandon, who is di-recting the construction of the Lewis-ton-Riparia branch for the contractors. ton-Riparia branch for the contractors. Erickson & Peterson, has stated that trains would be running into Lewiston by November 1. Fifty miles of grading work has been finished and the track has been laid to Central Ferry, 16 miles from Riparia. This distance has been thoroughly ballasted. The grading is not continuous, however, and there are long stretches yet untouched even on the surface.

The contractors have an agent in Chicago employing 1,000 Italian laborers to be distributed along the untouched places. Italians have been found to give the best satisfaction in railroad construction work and they will be brought west in special cars. Six hun-dred are now at work on the grading and contractors, by importing Italians, have solved the labor problem.

June 12 is class day, and at 10 a. m.


