### 12-MILE IRRIGATION DITCH FOR BAKER COUNTY

Water to Be Running Entire Length to Big Reservoir Site in Few Days.

(Special Dispatch to The Zournal.)

Baker City, Or., June 5.—Within the next week the 12-mile ditch of the Baker Irrigation company will be finished. J. A. Smith, who is in charge, states that water will be running the states that water will be running the full length of the ditch to the reservoir site within the next seven days. This is the first great irrigation project to be carried through and has had the effect of stimulating confidence of capitalists in the farming lands of this section to the extent that at the present there are from there to half a dozen similar projects under consideration which

llar projects under consideration which will be placed on a sound footing within the next year.

There is water in the upper portion of the ditch now, having been let in and run down gradually to soak up the bottom. Mr. Smith says the ditch holds water well and that there is but very little seepage. As soon as the ditch is completed, 10 miles being above the tunnel through Reservoir hill and two miles below, a little water will be run all the way to the reservoir. This will be done to soak up the bottom of the ditch and the water will later be used in sluicing in the banks of the reservoir, which is to be built in that manner. This will not require a full head of water and the ditch will not be carrying its capacity until next spring, when

actual irrigation is commenced. The reservoir is to be a feature of the project. It is a natural basin which needs but the sluicing in of banks to ete it. This great w is to cover 240 acres of land and the estimated capacity is 6,000 acre feet of water. Men have been engaged for some time past in preparing the site for the construction of the great earthen tank. The time for commencing work on the reservoir depends entirely upon the stage of water in Powder river.

From the reservoir miles of laterals

will be built to the land of the company There are 5,200 acres in the tract owned by the builders of the project, but only 2,000 acres of this will be under ditch. These laterals will be built this summer and fall.
