

CRUSHED TO DEATH BY STREETCAR

E. G. Luxon Meets With Fatal Accident When Car Jumps Track and Turns Over.

TRIES TO ESCAPE BUT IS PINNED UNDER WRECK

Victim Was Riding on Front Platform When Accident Occurred—Sharp Curve Said to Be Responsible for Mishap.

E. G. Luxon, an employe of the Marshall-Wells Hardware company, was fatally injured last night in the derailment of car-104 of the 8 line at Corbett and Gibbs streets, and died an hour later. The accident occurred at 11:45 p. m. as the car was rounding the curve at the intersection of the two streets. Luxon was riding on the front platform when the car left the rails, and in attempting to jump he was caught beneath the floor. Motorman Stenwig and Conductor Dean escaped serious injury, although the former was cut by flying glass. Luxon was removed to the Good Samaritan hospital where he died.

The car was coming toward the city on the last trip, and according to the carmen was running at a low rate of speed. When the curve was reached the heavy vehicle jumped the track, and after running on the ties for some distance turned completely over. Luxon, Conductor Dean and Motorman Stenwig were riding on the front end of the car. Luxon jumped just as the car tipped over and made the fatal mistake in leaping off the wrong side.

Great excitement was occasioned by the crash, which could be heard for blocks. In a very few minutes a large number of the residents of the vicinity were on the scene. A call was sent to engine company No. 2 and the firemen gave assistance. An outboard car arrived shortly after the accident and it did not take long with the aid of the firemen to raise the wreck and extricate Luxon.

Conscious When Taken From Wreck.
The injured man was conscious, but suffered great pain. Dr. Ruedy attended Luxon until he was removed to the hospital in the ambulance. Before the surgeons could make an examination death relieved the suffering of the unfortunate man.

Deceased was a native of Canada, 25 years of age, and resided with his cousin, G. L. Rolph, at 757 Chapman street. He came to this city about 18 months ago and secured employment with the Marshall-Wells Hardware company. The body was removed to Finley's undertaking parlors and an inquest will be held to fix the responsibility.

The curve at which the accident occurred has always been regarded as dangerous, owing to its sharpness. The statement of the motorman and conductor that the car was running at a moderate rate of speed would seem to indicate that some obstruction had lodged on the rails.

SPRIT OF PROGRESS SHOWS IN ACTIVITY OF EAST SIDE

At the meeting of the East Side Improvement association last night discussion of the recent increase in insurance rates occupied the foreground. The insurance men present assured the meeting that such was not the case, that the increase in rates was general and would affect all parts of the city alike. The statement was recently made that the east side would be the chief sufferer because of the rise in insurance rates. But it was shown to the satisfaction of the improvement association that this statement was not correct. A committee was appointed to be present at the meeting of the executive board next Friday, when the bids for the construction of the Grand avenue steel bridge over Sullivan's gulch are to be opened. This committee was instructed to urge that the contractor building the bridge be required to proceed without delay with the construction work, also to insist that the contractor be required to give a time limit bond, insuring the completion of the work in as short a time as possible.

The delay on the work of improving Union avenue came up for discussion. It was pointed out that this avenue is one of the most important thoroughfares on the east side, that the delay in improving it had extended over a much greater length of time than was necessary. It was decided to investigate this delay and see if some way could not be found to compel the contractor to finish the work in a reasonable length of time. The attendance at the meeting was not large, owing it is supposed to the excitement attending the election.

OBJECT TO WATER FUND CUT

Chamber of Commerce Members Urge Oregon Representation To Fight Against It.

APPROPRIATION MAY BE CUT BY CONGRESS

Fund for Gauging Streams to Ascertain Capacity for Power and Irrigation in Danger of Being Halved by Appropriation Committee.

To combat a reduction of \$100,000 in the appropriation by congress for gauging streams to ascertain their capacity for power and irrigation, the irrigation committee of the Portland chamber of commerce has taken vigorous action to enlist the support of congressmen and senators of Oregon and the cooperation of the cities of Washington and Idaho. In the sundry civil bill it has been the rule to set aside for the expenditure in gauging the flow and power of water courses and this fund has been largely expended in the western states. The appropriations committee has proposed to cut this appropriation in half. It is said such action would be a serious blow to the water power and irrigation interests of the people of the Pacific northwest.

HIGH LICENSE IS ATTACKED BY LIQUOR COMMITTEE

Ordinance Proposed by Councilman Wells Does Not Meet With Entire Approval.

Councilman Wells' proposed ordinance by which the saloon license would be raised from \$500 to \$1,000 was tacked for the first time by the liquor license committee of the council late yesterday afternoon.

Many suggestions were made, and some increased licenses may be recommended by the committee, but it is not probable that the \$1,000 license will be ordered.

A majority of the committee was in favor of raising the license of wholesale liquor merchants, who are now paying a \$200 fee. It is also likely that an additional license fee will be required of retailers. It was declared that practically every wholesaler in town is also a retailer, and that the profits from the business are so great that they are far more able to pay a higher fee than are many of the saloons.

Six hundred dollars for retailers and \$600 for wholesalers was suggested and may be adopted, though the committee decided to hold the matter over until the next meeting.

The following applications for saloon licenses were recommended by the committee: D. M. Jones, 191 Third street; John Hogabloom, 45 North Third street; James P. Murphy, 247 Taylor; Albright and Roberts, 50 North Twenty-third; F. Felder, 194 Fourth; Samuel Washington, 101 North Park; C. A. Linn, 441 First; A. Gerde, Hawthorne avenue and East Water. No. 247 Taylor street is the location of the El Rey, a resort put out of business by the council some time ago, after running undisturbed for many months. The new applicant for the same location, however, is said to be a new man in the city and has given promises that his saloon will comply with the law.

SCHOOL BOARD ARCHITECT IS SUBJECT OF PROTEST

Plumbers Allege He Shows Discrimination and Gives Insufficient Time for Bids.

Four plumbing establishments yesterday filed a protest with the board of education against the manner in which T. J. Jones, the board's architect, prepares specifications for work to be done on school buildings. The names signed to this document were: Gardner & Kendall, Jacobson-Bade company, J. F. Shea and Brady & Shierrett. It was stated that Jones does not allow sufficient time for the preparation of bids by contractors. Jones denied the statements of the heating men. This occurred at the special meeting of the directors called to consider bids for the heating plant of the new east side high school.

The J. C. Bayer Furnace company presented a separate communication, which was a reply to a question from Director Williams as to why no bid had been submitted by Bayer upon the high school plant. It is probable that the directors will make an investigation of the charges made against the architect.

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CAPTAIN BERGER HAS UNIQUE DISTINCTION

The proud distinction of being the first Prussian soldier to enter Paris after the terrible siege of the French capital by the troops of allied Germany is held by Captain H. Berger, the veteran director of the Royal Hawaiian band, which is to be seen here at the Hellig theatre, beginning tomorrow night for an engagement of ten nights, with a special matinee Saturday.

Captain Berger, who is so closely identified with the musical education of the natives of Hawaii, was born in Berlin, Germany, and received his musical education in that city. When a lad he entered the military service, and after a short period he was assigned to one of the crack cavalry bands. Promotion quickly came to him and when the Franco-Prussian war broke out in 1870 he was director of the Royal and Imperial Uhlan regiment, the body-guard of King William I of Prussia.

Captain Berger served with his regiment all through the terrible campaign and was present at the fearful battle of Gravelotte and at the siege of Metz and the surrender of Napoleon III at Sedan.

When Marshall Von Moltke and Prince Bismarck arranged the formation of the victorious Prussian troops for the entry into Paris after the siege and surrender of that city, it was the Royal and Imperial Uhlan regiment that led the way. At their head rode Captain Berger, and it was his voice that shouted "Hoch der Kaiser" as he passed under the Arche de Triomphe from the Place de Mars.

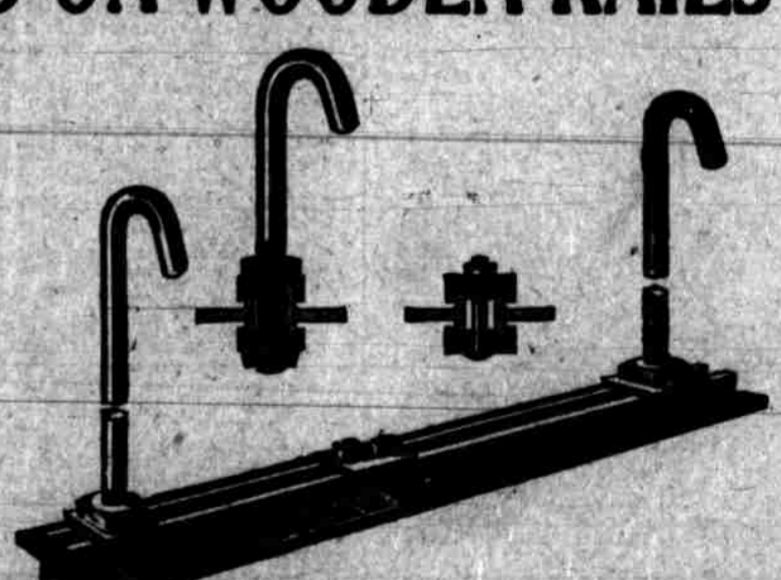
