COMPETITIONS WILL BE HELD IN SALEM

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 7.—The big four-track meet to be held in Salem this coming Saturday between the University of Oregon, the Oregon Agricultural college, Willamette university and Pacific seems to be the topic of the day among the students at Eugene. The meet, coming a few days before the second semester's examinations, promises to be largely attended by the students from the state university, who look on the day as a gala one before their hard work.

Much speculation as to the outcome of the meet is being engaged in and the fact that the first four places will count instead of the first three is giving deeper thought to the problem of which team is going to win the most points. All of the four contestants undoubtedly give Oregon the most, but it is natural that the interested ones inquire as to the final outcome.
