

# ROGUE RIVER VALLEY IS RICH IN MINERALS

## Dr. J. F. Reddy Says Country Has Great Future and Medford Is Destined to Become One of Greatest Cities.

Recent activities along development lines in southern Oregon have drawn an amount of attention never before received by that region from men who have experience and capital to apply to the task of opening up the country and showing its industrial possibilities. It is declared that the Rogue river valley not only has a good claim to the greatest future in horticulture of any district in the United States, but it is shown that Josephine and Jackson counties have immense mineral resources.

"I am satisfied that the Rogue river country has a great future, and that Medford is destined to become a city of considerable size and importance," said Dr. J. F. Reddy, who is registered at the Oregon. He has spent several years investigating the natural resources of Jackson and Josephine counties, and is regarded as one of the most thoroughly informed men in southern Oregon. A number of mining undertakings by him have "made good" and he is said to have justly earned the reputation of a man whose judgment can be relied upon by investors. He said:

**Rogue River Valley Rich.**  
The Rogue river valley has gold, silver, copper, zinc, lime, coal, marble and a fine quality of granite. Its base ores, although they never have received attention, are valuable. It has the iron in hematite and chrome. It has jade, or ornamental stone, onyx, asbestos and dikes of talc that will some day be developed. Its timber, water power and horticultural interests are very great. I do not hesitate to say that within a radius of 100 miles around Medford there are greater resources than in 200 miles around Spokane. The Rogue river country will therefore maintain a proportionately greater population and produce correspondingly greater wealth."

**Capital Is Interested.**  
That the Rogue river country has the greatest sugar pine forest in the world and that the mineral deposits of the valley are of great variety and richness, has long been known but little appreciated. Recently Spokane mining men and New York capitalists have taken cognizance of these conditions and have been investigating and investing in southern Oregon. It is said 500 men from Spokane have made investigations of mineral deposits in the Rogue River valley, while the figure 5 without cipher would about represent the number of southern Oregon men who have made similar examinations of their own country.

No record exists of the amount of wealth that is every year being taken out of the ground in southern Oregon. It is said a gold brick is shipped nearly every day and the proceeds go to New York owners. The record of the gold becomes a part of California reports of

gold production and Oregon gets no official credit.  
"While the region is rich in a variety of minerals, it is properly a copper country," said Dr. Reddy. "The copper deposits are attracting Spokane mine operators and eastern mining men. Robert S. Towne, who owns the Blue Ledge copper mine, 20 miles west and south of Medford, in the main range of the Siskiyou, has a force of 125 men at work developing the property. He is a copper mining man and well understands the work he has undertaken here and what the results will be. He will probably invest a million dollars in Blue Ledge before he takes a dividend. He is the owner of a number of smelters and railroads in Mexico and undoubtedly will build a railroad from the Blue Ledge to connect with the Southern Pacific at Medford."

**Buy Smelter Site.**  
Mr. Towne has purchased a smelter site in the Applegate valley. When the largest individual copper mine on the coast selects a district in which to enter upon a gigantic mining enterprise it is said to mean that the district chosen must possess extraordinary copper values. This conclusion is reached by mining men who have noted the significance of Mr. Towne's course in southern Oregon. It is said his decision to locate a great mining industry there is the most powerful and convincing argument that could be used to shatter the seeming indifference and neglect that have been shown by Oregon people toward one of the richest sections of their wonderful commonwealth.

In the Blue Ledge district there are many other good mines now being developed by Spokane men. The Bloomfield, owned by Peter Larson, Joe C. Adams and Andrew Jeldness; the Siskiyou Copper company mine, owned by Spokane and St. Catharines, Ontario, people; the Joe Creek Copper mine, owned by J. C. Chapman, a banker of Red Lodge, Montana; William Hart Hamilton of Crescent City, California; Henry Engel of Medford and George Putnam of The Journal—all these properties are being developed rapidly and making fine showings. The New York owners of the Opp mine have completed plans to install 40 stamps, their mill, making it a 60-stamp mill, the largest in Oregon.

"In the Bloomfield mine a strike was made the other day, where three or four feet of 15 per cent ore was taken out," said Dr. Reddy.  
There are about 1,000 claims now located in the Blue Ledge district. Nearly the entire camp is made up of Spokane men. It is said a mine well secured and open a better mine with less expense in southern Oregon than in any other mining camp in the United States.

and a large part of the crowd followed him to the police station. The Mills and Henderson arrived here from San Francisco shortly after the earthquake and have been holding street meetings. They claim to be regularly ordained ministers of the Church of God and are in possession of certificates signed by Apostle J. P. Smith of San Antonio, Texas. Considerable complaint has been made of their utterances on the public streets and Chief of Police Fritzmacher instructed all patrolmen to arrest them if necessary.

Patrolman Carr was one of their auditors last night and did not interfere until their language became offensive. Mills was the principal speaker of the evening and opened his remarks with the declaration that all of those who had perished in the San Francisco disaster were now in the realms of Pluto. He took for his text the first chapter of the book of Daniel, and after getting warmed up to the subject took occasion to attack the Roman Catholic church and finally wound up by assailing the Hebrews. His language is said to have been obscene and vulgar and there was muttering heard in the crowd. At this juncture the policeman made his way through the crowd and placed Mills and Henderson under arrest.

Although no specific charges were placed against the two men, yet they were brought before Municipal Judge Cameron this morning. They denied the allegations made against them and declared that they had only quoted from the Bible. Judge Cameron informed them that he would not tolerate such conduct on the public streets and extended the warning if any further complaints were made he would deal severely with them.

The tenets of the Church of God as outlined by Mills is the observance of the Sabbath on Saturday, the discharging of the teachings of the early fathers and the refusal to believe in present day inspiration. While in San Francisco Mills and Henderson preached nightly at Grant avenue and Market street up to the time of the earthquake, and it is understood that the police of that city had similar trouble with them.

## TORNADOES SWEEP TWO STATES

### One Man Killed in Minnesota and Many Injured in Wisconsin by Hurricanes.

### BRIDGE IS CARRIED OUT—TRAIN FLAGGED IN TIME

### Infant Child Picked Up and Denuded by Storm but Found Unhurt—Much Damage Done to Crops—Two Towns in Ruins.

La Crosse, Wis., June 7.—Halvor Halvorsen was fatally injured, six others were seriously injured and 10 buildings were leveled by a tornado near Stoddard, Wisconsin, tonight.  
Others injured are: Mrs. Charles Scheck, Carl Scheck, William Jones, Mrs. Louise Scheck and infant child. Julius Granke and several others are more or less seriously hurt.

The hurricane centered apparently east of Stoddard, Vernon county, passed over Coon valley and Mormon Coulee, striking Stoddard and Brimkam most heavily. Wires are down.  
In La Crosse there was much damage. Washouts are reported on the railroads. A bridge on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, near Stoddard, was carried out and a Burlington passenger train, carrying 200 passengers, was flagged at the brink of the gap by a farmer named Miller and many lives were saved.

### TOWNS DEVASTATED.

Buildings in Wyoming and North Branch, Minnesota, Demolished.

St. Paul, June 7.—A tornado at 5 o'clock last evening swept over Wyoming and North Branch, small towns 15 miles north, doing much damage. Mr. Engdahl of North Branch is reported killed. Several others were injured.  
The storm formed near Lindstrom and cut a path 500 yards wide for 15 miles, felling houses and uprooting trees. Small buildings were razed and large ones moved from their foundations.  
At Linwood the La Duke stock farm buildings were destroyed. The house and barn of Henry Funk were completely destroyed and his wife and son severely injured. Mrs. Funk had her 15-month-old babe in her arms when the storm came up, and though she tried to cling to it, it was blown away. Later it was found some distance away, unhurt, but without a stitch of clothing on it.

### STEAMER FREIGHT IS TIED UP BY LOCKOUT

San Francisco, June 7.—A general tieup of freight at this port resulted when the Pacific Mail, the San Francisco-Portland, the Pacific Coast Steamship and the United Shipping & Transportation companies laid off gangs of stevedores as a result of the steam schooner men's fight. Shipowners state that the lockout is in anticipation of a strike to be declared by the sailors, and that the companies did not wish to have freight on hand which they could not deliver. Union officials, however, declare that they have no intention of extending the fight beyond sailors on schooners.

## UNKNOWN WEALTHY WOMAN IS BURIED AT SEA

### Drops Dead of Heart Disease on Deck of Steamer and is Dropped Into Waves.

New York, June 7.—On the first-class cabin passenger list of the Hamburg-American Atlas liner, Salvoia, which arrived today from Kingston, was the name of Mrs. E. L. Allen, said to be a wealthy American woman, who died Sunday on board and was buried at sea at midnight. Although she was richly dressed and had plenty of money, steamer officers say they have not the slightest idea as to her identity or the whereabouts of her home. No inquiries were made for her upon the arrival of the steamer.

Mrs. Allen, who was about 53 years old, boarded the Salvoia at Kingston Friday afternoon. Sunday afternoon, while walking on the deck, she dropped dead from heart disease. There was not sufficient ice aboard to allow for the preservation of her body, and an immediate burial was decided upon. Passengers gathered on the deck at midnight, when the captain read the burial service and the remains of Mrs. Allen were dropped into the sea.

## PAY \$50,000 FOR STOCK

### Pennsylvania Clerk on Small Salary Managed to Accumulate Fortune in Coal Properties.

Philadelphia, June 7.—Joseph K. Aikens, for 27 years chief clerk of the Monongahela division of the Pennsylvania railroad, today testified before the interstate commerce commission hearing to owning 1,200 shares of coal mine stock, which cost him \$50,000. He received a small amount of additional stock as a gift. He admitted sending Boyer \$46,000, which the latter received, as admitted yesterday. The money was sent as commission on a business matter in which Boyer looked out for Aikens' interests. Aikens ranged from \$30 to \$125 monthly during his 20 years of employment. He bought coal stocks through investing his wages. He was once given \$300 by an operator. He also received \$50 monthly for an "indeterminate interest" in a company store. Casnatt has directed the immediate dismissal of Joseph B. Boyer, who has confessed to receiving secret commissions on the company's coal purchases.

## KING'S MINISTERS OF STATE HAVE RESIGNED

## STREET PREACHERS TAKEN TO JAIL

### Negro Ministers Almost Cause Riot by Utterances Before Large Audience.

### CHARGED WITH USING IMPROPER LANGUAGE

### Declared, It Is Alleged, That All Those Who Perished in San Francisco Horror Are Now Suffering Tortures in Realms of Pluto.

By declaring in vehement terms that the Roman Catholic clergy and Sisters of Mercy were corrupt and that ministers of the gospel in general were degenerates, J. R. Mills and D. J. Henderson, itinerant colored street preachers, almost precipitated a riot last night at Sixth and Washington streets. The crowd which had gathered to listen to the exhortations of the two negroes was in an ugly mood. Patrolman Carr took both men into custody for the use of profane and abusive language. Carr was vociferously cheered as he took his two prisoners to the city prison.
