

The Market Basket

Here's the tip. Watch these markets closely during the next week or so: Cherries, blackberries, raspberries, currants. It's high time you were paying close attention to the cherry market if you propose to put any away for winter's use. Kentish cherries are now coming quite lively to market and the price has already gone down to 5 cents a pound.

There are but scant supplies of currants in the market at this time and prices are still high. There are indications that this product will not get very cheap this season. This is one of the markets that will bear watching. It's nearly time to buy.

There are somewhat better supplies of local raspberries in market today but considering the demand stocks are still quite small. The production of raspberries has been curtailed for some reason as in strawberries. Market will bear watching.

It's not every housewife in Portland who can afford to buy cantaloupes at the present price. The fruit is selling at 40 cents a piece in the retail markets. The "cents" now coming are from Death Valley, California, where they can be produced at any time of the year. The fruit is produced considerably below the level of the ocean.

Cherry plums have made their appearance in the retail markets and they are of fairly good quality for first available. The present supplies are from California and are rather high in price. Other plums are much more plentiful and the price is lower. There is an improvement in the quality here, too.

With only a few crops in California it is quite unlikely that the price of apricots will go very low in the markets during the present season. California produces by far the greater portion of the cantaloupes grown in the United States and the shortage there will affect prices throughout the world.

Today a better supply of peaches is shown in all the retail markets. Those in market are of the Alexander variety and come from California. The price has dropped quite a bit during the past few days. By the way, this is another market you'll need to watch. The indications are that prices will not go so very low this season.

Green corn is now coming much more lively to the retail markets. The price today is ranging from 40 to 50 cents a dozen, according to quality. Asparagus is fast going out of market and the price is beginning to advance quite sharply. Practically all now coming is from Aurora. They grow the best there, say the dealers.

New Oregon potatoes have made their appearance in the markets. They are still of very small size but the price is larger. Those from California are now very plentiful and they are getting to be quite good. Small difference in the price. Old potatoes are nearly out.

yet the extra quality of the fruit will more than compensate for any loss in quantity. Rains have interfered with the making of alfalfa hay and but little of the first crop was harvested without damage. The second crop, however, is growing luxuriantly and is now from 8 to 10 inches high. Strawberries and cherries are now in their prime and corn is making a good growth in spite of the unfavorable weather.

of market. Those left are very cheap. Hothouse tomatoes grown at Mount Tabor are now plentiful. There are also good supplies from the outside. Mississippi tomatoes are quite good and those from Mexico are worth eating. Best are 25 cents a pound in the retail markets today.

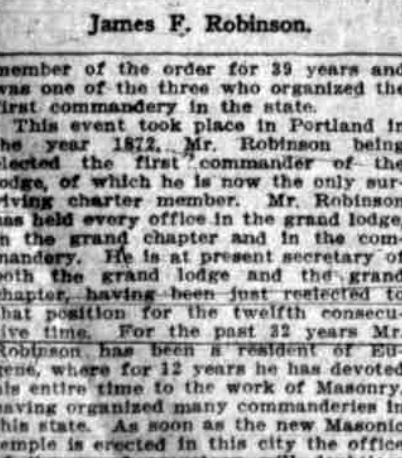
