"I can state of my own knowledge that the cold storage fowl is kept by the trust for weeks or for months, and I have actually seen fowls that have been in storage for two and a hulf years.

"The trust knows it cannot dress fowl and keep it in storage without it becoming so sour that it would never be able to doctor it in such a way as to fool the public, so it does what is infinitely worse—it leaves the various organs in the fowl's body.

Chickens Poisonous.

"While the outside of the fowl doesn't really look bad, there is a constant process of decay going on among the organs, which soften into the most poisonous kind of mess, and this of course infects the inside of the fowl which is

exposed to it.

"Dr. Wiley, the government chemist, has examined the trust's cold storage fowl, and his reports show that they are actually poisonous.

What Salt Junk Is.

"The packers had sent to the front at high prices frozen beef. There is a great difference between freezing and refrigerating, for as long as beef is kept in the freezers it looks all right, but away from the freezers 24 hours it gets slimy and putrefles.
