POVERTY ON THE WANE IN

GREATER NEW YORK

State Association's Report to

Mayor McClellan Shows De-

crease in Paupers.

New York, June 18.—Poverty is on the wane in Greater New York, according to the statement made to Mayor McClelian by the visiting committee of the State Charities Ald association. The committee visitors found, they fold the mayor, that, while the population of the whole city during the last 15 years has increased 60 1-10 per cent, the number of almahouse inmates has increased in that period only 37% per cent. They also found that while the population had increased is 8-10 per cent in the last five years, the number of patients in public hospitals had increased 24 8-10 per cent in that time.

An aged and experienced horse, valued at \$40, fell dead at sight of an automobile yesterday about 18 miles east of Portland, on the Sandy road. The horse was attached to a vehicle, and was in the act of passing an automobile occupied by John Riddle and a party of friends of Portland.

Mr. Riddle had stopped his machine at some bars, through which he was about to pass when the horse and driver came up to him. The horse was in a state of extreme trepidation, and the motor car party suggested that the carbe taken through the bars before he attempted to pass. him this morning, the Polish National

Private Detectives Arrested on Schooner National City for Firing Into Boat of Sailors.

San Francisco, June 18.—Four officers, after an ail night search, this morning found the steam schooner National City lying off Hunters Point and arrested Port Captain George F. Hammer and Daniel T. Caphill, Joseph B. Hubbard and Frank Martin, suspected of firing the shots which killed Andrew Kellerman and wounded three other union pickets, who, in a launch, were trying to draw away the nonunion crews at night.

The suspects were taken to Park station. They had four Springfield riffes, three revolvers, several clubs and much ammunition.

Caphill, Martin and Hubbard asserted

Caphill, Martin and Hubbard asserted that they were employed by the Curtin detective agency and placed aboard to watch the vessel. They had received orders from the owners to allow no one on board. They claim that they erdered the launch to hait and that the union men, armed with guns, fired at them. The union men in the launch deny that they had any arms, and say that the shooting was unprovoked. The arrested men will be arraigned tomorrow.

The shooting occurred when a launch occupied by about 15 union sailors was fired on from the schooner National City as it lay near the Union Iron Works. According to the men who were in the launch, several volleys were fired at them without warning when they were within a few feet of the

Government Announces That Quiet Has Been Restored But Assaults Still Continue--- Elaborate Scheme of the Anti-Semitic Riots Throughout Russia Alleged Discovered. General Strike May End in Revolution

St. Petersburg, June 18.—It is officially stated that quiet has been restored at Bialystok. The governor of
the province has instructed the public
that order must be preserved. Nevertheless, reports of continued massacres
are still being received.

A correspondent wires that he counted
250 Jews dead at Bialystok and estimates that 1,500 were killed.

A dispatch from Berlin states that
Nathan, chairman of the association of
German Jews, says that he has absolute proof that the massacre at Bialystok is the beginning of an elaborate
scheme of anti-semitic outbreaks to occur in all perts of Russia. Riots started in several towns near Bialystok.

Bialystok rioters today attacked the
