CLAIMS CITY HARBORS REDS

Walter Sealaszkiwicz Tells Police Band of Anarchists Makes Headquarters in Portland—Has Warrants Issued

Starting conditions relative to the organization of anarchists holding forth in Portland were made to the police this morning by Walter Sealaszkiwicz, formerly president of the local branch of the Polish National Alliance, who claims to have been assaulted and robbed by seven followers of the red flag during the progress of a meeting held at 116 Russell street last night.

Sealaszkiwicz's revelations make it imperative for the police to undertake an investigation. He swore to consultants charging his assistants with assault and battery and the warrants have been placed in the hands of Patrolman Murphy for service.

POVERTY ON THE WANE IN GREATER NEW YORK

State Association's Report to Mayor McClellan Shows Decrease in Paupers.

New York, June 18.—Poverty is on the wane in Greater New York, according to the statement made to Mayor McClellan by the visiting committee of the State Charities Aid association. The committee visitors found, they told the mayor, that while the population of the whole city during the last 15 years has increased 50 to 60 per cent, the number of almshouse inmates has increased in that period only 37 1/2 per cent.

Private Detectives Arrested on Schooner National City for Firing into Boat of Sailors.

San Francisco, June 18.—Four officers, after an all night search, this morning found the steam schooner National City lying off Hunters Point and arrested Port Captain George F. Hamner and Daniel T. Cahill, Joseph B. Hubbard and Frank Martin, suspected of firing the shots which killed Andrew Kellerman and wounded three other union pickets, who, in a launch, were trying to draw away the nonunion crew at night.

Government Announces That Quiet Has Been Restored But Assaults Still Continue—Elaborate Scheme of the Anti-Semitic Riots Throughout Russia Alleged Discovered. General Strike May End in Revolution

St. Petersburg, June 18.—It is officially stated that quiet has been restored at Bialystok. The governor of the province has instructed the public that order must be preserved. Nevertheless, reports of continued massacres are still being received.

The shooting occurred when a launch occupied by about 15 union sailors was fired on from the schooner National City as it lay near the Union Iron Works. According to the men who were in the launch, several volleys were fired at them without warning when they were within a few feet of the schooner.

INDICTED FOR SELLING TO TOBACCO TRUST

Federal Grand Jury Returns True Bills Against Licorice Dealers and Bail Is Fixed.

New York, June 18.—The federal grand jury today indicted the McAndrews & Forbes company, its president, Karl Juengleuth, John A. Young & Co. of Baltimore and Howard Young, who are charged with violation of the anti-trust law for selling licorice paste to the tobacco trust, discriminating against and to the exclusion of other tobacco manufacturers.

ENGINE RUNS INTO ITALIAN WORK TRAIN
