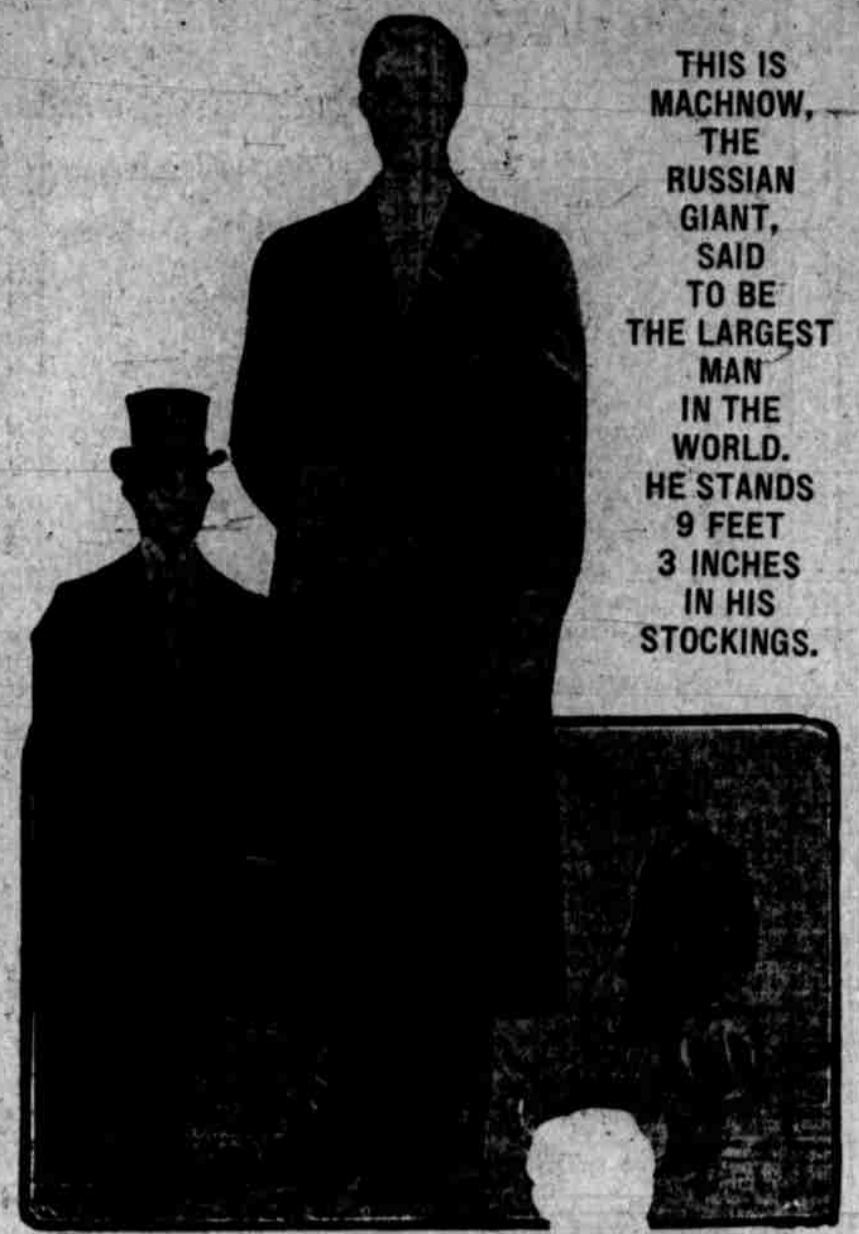


GIANT IS DRAGGED TO BOAT BY TWENTY-TWO STRONG MEN



THIS IS MACHNOW, THE RUSSIAN GIANT, SAID TO BE THE LARGEST MAN IN THE WORLD. HE STANDS 9 FEET 3 INCHES IN HIS STOCKINGS.

New York, June 26.—The largest man in the world, Makhnow, the Russian giant, is among the recent arrivals from Europe on the steamer Pretoria. He comes to go on exhibition.
In spite of the enormous size of Makhnow, who stands 9 feet 3 inches in his stockings and weighs more than 400 pounds, he is afraid of sea traveling and this is the first ocean voyage he has made, although he often received large offers to appear in this country.

When Makhnow reached Dover, preparatory to sailing for New York, he refused to leave the car to board the steamer.
His wife, almost in tears, pleaded in vain with him to try and overcome his fear of the sea, but he remained steadfast in his determination to cancel the American engagement.
At length it was found necessary to drag him out of the car by main force and, wildly fighting and protesting, he was placed on a stretcher formed by the shoulders of 22 seamen and carried to the Pretoria's deck.

WORTH A FORTUNE BUT LIVED IN FILTH

Berlin, June 26.—From Tzaganog, South Russia, comes the report of the death of an eccentric individual who formerly held a subordinate position under the government, but had lived for years the life of a recluse under conditions a beggar would despise. His clothes consisted of filthy rags and he lived on offal picked up in the gutter. After his death \$25,000 in cash was found in his miserable garret, a large number of bonds and deeds of several pieces of land, bringing up the value of his estate to \$125,000.
The miser left a will directing that his two daughters, whom he had constantly refused to see, should enjoy the interest on his fortune for life, the entire estate after their death to become the property of their church.

CZAR DISTRACTED BY MURDERS

Assassination of Government Officials Continues in Many Parts of Russia.

FRESH MASSACRES OF JEWS PLANNED TODAY

Council of Empire Follows Policy of Wait and Watch, Fearing to Expel Agitators Lest They Return With Others.

(Journal Special Service.)
St. Petersburg, June 26.—With murders of minor officials continuing in various parts of the empire the government is well nigh distracted. To add to the trouble reports come of a panicky feeling in Bialystok, of persistent rumors of another contemplated massacre of Jews, which is said to have been planned for today. Strict orders have been issued to the troops to put down any attempt at a riot and to prevent gatherings.

The chief aim of the czar's advisors just now seems to be to avoid an open rupture with the lower houses of parliament. Their idea seems to be that the strongest card for them to play is to permit the peasant representatives and the covertly revolutionary groups to spend their energy in debate on the theory that the government has larger resources of passive resistance and can afford to wait for time to moderate the popular passions of late so explosion.

It is reported from St. Petersburg by journals, once known to be in close touch with Count Witte that before he started for Vichy he urged his colleagues in the council of the empire to adopt a policy of *wait and watch*, the program of wait and watch.
The feeling seems to have found its origin in the advice given the czar before the former's departure for Germany. He told Gorenvsky that no formula would ever be less difficult to manage than this one and that if it were treated to virtual expulsion the result would parallel the scriptural episode where the expelled devil returned with several others worse than himself. His advice is said to have made a deep impression on the czar, who is "tamatically susceptible to scriptural similes."
Matters are shaping now for a prolongation of the run of the lower houses through the summer, with the odds decidedly in favor of some large concessions to the peasants in the direction of their land ambitions. The composition of the agrarian commission is a proof of parliamentary moderation, and unless Treppoff attempts some desperate coup the situation will improve. M. Treppoff would abolish all semblance of constitutional government but the attitude of the troops checks him.
Word comes from Ufa that Prince Manveloff, owner of a vast estate, and one time an officer in the guards, has been killed in the streets, the assassina-

WISCONSIN DEMOCRATS IN FAVOR OF BRYAN

State Convention That Meets Tomorrow Will Sing Praises of Nebraskan.

Milwaukee, Wis., June 26.—The Democratic state convention for the adoption of a platform of principles assemblies here tomorrow and numerous party leaders are already gathering for the event. While it was announced at the time it was decided to hold a state convention that no attempt would be made to nominate a ticket, that the work of the convention would be confined to the adoption of a platform, the indications are that the state will be practically agreed upon before the convention is over.
There is little question that the convention will endorse William J. Bryan as the party leader. As at present outlined the resolutions will not name Bryan as a candidate for the presidency, but will laud him as the greatest leader of the party now living and will indicate beyond any possible doubt that Wisconsin Democrats would be glad to follow the Nebraskan as the standard-bearer in the next presidential campaign.

Connaught to Travel.

SPRING SEASON IN GAY PARIS

Dramatic Revenge of Husband Upon Wife Who Proved to Be Untrue to Him.

THEATRE HAT CONDEMNED BY PARISIAN AUDIENCES

French Courts Have Just Decided That Will of Peasant Leaving Estate to Favorite Bay Horse Is Valid in Law.

Paris, June 26.—A dramatic vengeance was taken by a deceived husband at Belleville, the industrial quarter of Paris. Disguised as an aged beggar, with long gray beard, he took up a position outside a church and opposite the house where he thought his wife was carrying on an intrigue with another man. For two days he remained there, kneeling in a supplicatory attitude and asking for alms.
One morning a man and a woman came out of the house, and the woman threw a coin to the pathetic figure on the church steps.
Instantly the supposed beggar leaped to his feet and drew a revolver from his rags. He fired and the bullet entered the woman's neck. She fell to the ground and was taken to a hospital, where her life is despaired of.

American Drabs Thief.
An American visitor gained the admiration of a Parisian crowd the other day by his drastic treatment of a pickpocket.
Standing in a crowd watching a bioscope display at a street corner, he detected a thief in the act of running off with his \$200 gold watch and a scarf pin.
Pursuing the man, he had nearly caught him when the "Apache" turned and fired twice at him with a revolver, the bullets passing through the American's coat. In the next moment the American had knocked his man down and was punning him.

He recovered his property, and after handing the pickpocket over to the police went back to the bioscope show.

To Abolish Theatre Hats.
The theatre hat has been doomed by an overwhelming vote in favor of its abolition. On one evening last week blankets were distributed among the audiences of all theatres in Paris, upon which the following questions appeared: "Do you favor the abolition of hats at the theatres?" "Do you favor the adoption of a small, neat, open hat?" "Do you wish the present style in evening hats to be maintained?"
Out of 100,000 voters, 60,000 pronounced themselves in favor of the abolition of hats at the theatres, 28,000 odd pronounced for the small hat, and the remainder voted for the maintenance of the status quo.

A meeting of the theatrical managers of Paris has taken place and an agreement has been reached according to which no hats will be admitted to the parquet and first balcony of any of the first-class playhouses. This rule always existed with regard to the Opera and Theatre Francaise.

Important Invention.
A Frenchman named Jean Denisse, living at Roubaix, has invented a system for firing torpedoes at long range by means of electric waves. Starting with Dr. Brauly's discovery whereby an electric beam and electric motors can be started by wireless transmission at considerable distance, Denisse has perfected a device which is highly sensitive and of great precision and can be used in the water. It will receive electric waves without mast or post at a distance of several miles. The manufacturing cost of the machine is about 50 francs, or \$10.

Horse Inherits Estate.
The French courts have just decided a curious case which has attracted much attention. A wealthy peasant, who died at his home near Toulouse. According to the will, the horse was to inherit the old man's entire property, but the animal died before the testator. His relatives of the deceased tried to break the will, but it has been upheld by the court.

Law Removing Tattoo Marks.
Tattooing having gone entirely out of fashion, notwithstanding the many European sovereigns are decorated in this wise, Parisian beauty doctors are busy obliterating the undesired marks. Their process is a very simple one, but of course should be attempted by an amateur, as an improper use of the mixtures used would make a good deal worse mark than the one which an attempt had been made to obliterate.

For removing tattoo marks proceed as follows: Buy the beauty doctors. Bathe the mark with a solution of tannin, and then prick the design all over in precisely the same dots as those made by the ink with a special set of needles. When this is done a stick of nitrate of silver should be rubbed over the design and finally it should be covered with a coat of tannin prepared with ether. In time the skin will drop off and the tattoo disappear, but in its stead a mark resembling a burn will remain. This mark the beauty doctors only with great care and patience can remove.

Maine Congressmen Resigned.
