## M'MURRAY NAMED FOR POSITION

Receives Appointment as General Passenger Agent of Harriman Lines in Oregon.

### GETS PLACE OF CRAIG WHO LEAVES PORTLAND

New Official Has Made Excellent Record Since Engaging in Railroad Business—Leaves for Chicago for Conference.

Just before William McMurray, assistant general passenger agent of the Harriman lines in Oregon, left last night for Chicago, he received from J. C. Stubbs, director of traffic, official notification of his appointment to the position vacated by General Passenger Agent A. L. Craig, who goes to St. Paul July 1 to become passenger traffic manager of the Great Northern.

At the same time Mr. McMurray was advised that his successor in the office

of assistant general passenger agent will be John M. Scott of Chicago, who is now chief clerk in the office of Mr. Stubbs. Mr. Scott was formerly chief rate clerk at Omaha for the Union Pacific, and is regarded by Mr. Stubbs as one of the most promising of the many capable and ambitious young men in the Harriman traffic department service all over the west.

Mr. McMurray goes to Chicago to attend a conference of heads of departments of the Harriman companies, and it is apparent that Mr. Stubbs wished him to come to the meeting clothed with full authority of a general passenger agent.
