

OAKS NOT BAD AS TRAIL, HE SAYS

Yet, Declares Dr. Brougher, It is an Ungodly Place to Spend Sunday In.

DANCING PAVILION IS VICE SCHOOL, HE SAYS

Condemns Sale of Liquor at the Amusement Park and Intimates That Boys Under Age Can Procure It If They So Desire.

Last night at the White Temple, Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher declared that while many of the amusement features at the Oaks were bad, they were not as bad as those on the Trail at the Lewis and Clark exposition. He declared the dancing pavilion was a menace to the morals of the community. Dr. Brougher said, in part:

"The Oaks as an amusement resort is run for the purpose of making money and catering to all classes of society. Some of the attractions are elevating, others indifferent, while others are degrading. It is a case of pay your money and take your choice. You can get what you want. You can see what you bring with you the power to see. It is a combination of good and bad. It is not as bad as the Trail at the Lewis and Clark exposition. I wish I could condemn everything out there. There are some things that the Christian conscience must condemn. The Oaks Amusement company as such may have had nothing to do with the election frauds. But the men who did commit the frauds were working to keep the precinct wet, so that liquor could be sold at the taverns. In spite of the effort of the management to prevent liquor selling to minors, it is not very difficult for a young fellow to misrepresent his age and get liquor. I was told of at least two young fellows under age who secured a drink of beer without any difficulty. The election that kept the precinct wet ought to be declared illegal and the men who perpetrated the fraud be sent to the penitentiary. But there is not much hope of it with the present prosecuting attorney. He will wait until the winter months have passed and have the cases dismissed. No difference how careful the management may be, some of us can never approve of the sale of liquor at the Oaks or any other place.

Condemns Sunday Opening.

There is no possible excuse except the desire for making money for running all the attractions and selling liquor on the Lord's day. The dancing pavilion, the skating rink and the various shows are in full blast all day Sunday. I do not see how it is possible for a Christian to receive the sanction of his conscience to go to the Oaks on Sunday. If it were conducted merely as a park, with good music, it would be different. But under the present conditions the Christians who expect to have the approval of Jesus Christ and the respect of the ungodly must shut out the Oaks on Sunday.

STRANGE TALE OF BIG DIAMOND

Pennsylvania Paper Says Portland Woman Found Gem Worth Three Thousand Dollars.

CAME IN MAIL IN IRISH POTATO, THE STORY SAYS

Left to Lie in Tub for a Year, Stone Was Finally Discovered by Accident—Names of People Mentioned Not in City Directory.

The Pennsylvania Grit, in its issue for July 8, prints a remarkable story relating to the alleged finding of a \$3,000 diamond in a potato by a Portland woman, Mrs. John P. Riche. The Grit further says that the discovery of the gem was made possible by investigations carried on by a Professor Handell of the Portland High school. Neither name appears in the city directory, from which it is surmised that the story is incorrect. It is here printed in full, as an example of interesting narrative: Hidden safely away in an ordinary white potato there reposed for over a year, undiscovered, a pure white gem valued at something over \$3,000. Months ago, Mrs. John P. Riche of Portland, Oregon, received through the mail a mysterious package with a South African postmark. Not knowing any one in that far off land she removed the stiff weather-soiled outside wrapping carefully and gingerly opened the little wooden box which came to view. There in lay a spherical object which seemed to be composed of coarse clay.

He reported it perfectly harmless and analyzed it with out any loss of brittle clay very much the same as that used in schools for modeling purposes.

This was quieting but although the analysis allayed Mrs. Riche's fears the knowledge that the little ball was only a bit of plastic earth did not assuage her curiosity nor bring her one step nearer the solution of the mystery surrounding the ball. It was the talk of the vicinity for a period far exceeding the stipulated nine days and every visitor to the Riche home was conducted with great pomp and solemnity to the "parlor" where he or she was allowed to examine the mysterious diamond. The professor while the Riche's stood by awaiting speculations and hoping that some guess might accidentally bring light and put them on the right track. Although many wild ideas were advanced the diamond slipped by without any being found and finally one year elapsed since the receipt of this mysterious package.
