

EVIDENCE AGAINST HEMBREE WEAK

Believed by Tillamook People That Defendant Will Be Acquitted of Charge.

NO NEW POINTS WERE BROUGHT OUT TODAY

James Thompson's Evidence Yesterday Afternoon Was Strongest the Prosecution Has Secured in the Case.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tillamook, Or., July 27.—J. Abram Hembree will be acquitted of the charge of murdering his wife and daughter, then cremating their remains in his house to cover up the evidence of his crime, is the general belief here since hearing the testimony at this morning's session of the trial.

Several witnesses were called to the stand this morning, but nothing new was introduced, and it is generally believed that facts sufficient to establish the prisoner's guilt have not been introduced.

Square Still Burning. That after the Hembree house had practically burned to the ground there was still a section about seven feet square from which the flames leaped five or six feet high, as though something had been piled up there, making it burn longer than the rest of the structure, was the testimony of James Thompson, who appeared as a witness yesterday afternoon. This portion of the fire, Thompson said, was where the charred bones of Mrs. Hembree and her daughter Ora were found.

Not Worried About Family. Thompson, with his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Hoyt, were the witnesses called yesterday. Thompson testified that about 2:45 a. m., December 29, Hembree rushed up to the Hoyt home on Sand Lake, where the witness resides, but half-clothed and informed Thompson that his house had burned and asked if his wife and daughter were there. Upon learning that his family had not sought refuge at the Hoyt home, Hembree entered the house and requested Thompson to go and look for them at the neighbors' houses. He told Thompson that when the fire broke out he rushed to the stable and his wife and daughter went back to the house for some of the things they had left. When he returned from the stable his family was nowhere to be seen, and he supposed they had made their way to the Hoyt home.

Evaded Questions. According to the testimony of the witness Hembree was extremely nervous about answering questions, but did not seem alarmed over the fate of his wife and child, being perfectly willing to eat breakfast and retire, allowing them to take care of themselves.

Face Was Bruised. Scratches and bruises which Hembree had on his face when he appeared at the Hoyt house he was inclined to be reticent about, the witness said, appearing nervous when questioned and trying to avoid answering.

BURGLAR IS FATALLY SHOT BY POLICEMAN

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spokane, July 27.—A big fire started yesterday in the pine timber, nine miles west of Potlatch, Idaho. Shovels and buckets were ordered from Spokane and every precaution is being taken by the Potlatch Lumber company with hundreds of men to keep the fire from wiping out the town. Potlatch was built by the Weyerhaeuser syndicate and has 500 houses, a depot, which was built this summer, and the largest sawmill in the United States, under construction.

WEYERHAUSER TOWN THREATENED BY FIRE

Weston, Or., July 27.—Three Salt Lake City attorneys have just been in the city for the purpose of taking depositions of witnesses who met Mrs. Helena Enberg, who has brought action for \$25,000 damages against the O. S. L. N. company for injuries sustained in an accident a few months ago when coming from Salt Lake to this place to visit a brother. Two of the attorneys, Messrs. Jones and Smith, represent the defense, and Attorney South the plaintiff. Mrs. Enberg was in Weston immediately after the accident, and her friends and relatives here understood the nature and seriousness of the injuries. It promises to be an interesting and hard-fought case.
