Wallowa Valley Railway Company and O. R. & N. in Legal Contest.

CLAIMED HARRIMAN TOOK COOK'S LINE

Wallowa Valley Company Organized by Cook—Farmers Had Lost Faith in Previous Corporation Which Delayed Construction of Railroad.

Before Judge Aiken at La Grande final hearing has been had in the case of the O. R. & N. Co. against the Wallowa Valley Railway company and W. J. Cook in an effort by the O. R. & N. to gain title to certain rights of way wrenched by it from possession of the company headed by Mr. Cook.
