#### **ENDS LIFE WITH RIFLE** AT COUNTY HOSPITAL

Despondent over prolonged illness

Despondent over prolonged illness, James Tiddle, an inmate of the county hospital, ended his life at 10:20 o'clock last night by shooting himself with a 22-caliber rifle. Tiddle had long been a sufferer from organic heart disease, having been admitted to the hospital over two years ago. Recently the disease became more pronounced.

The rifle with which he ended his existence had been given him by Superintendent Jackson to shoot gophers. He hid the weapon in his bed last night and awaited a favorable opportunity to carry out his plan of self-destruction. Shortly after 10 o'clock he stole quietly and unobserved to the porch and, placing the mussle of the gun to his head, pulled the trigger. The man lived for about an hour but nothing could be done to save his life.

According to the hospital officials he never gave any indication of suicidal mania. Tiddle leaves a family of several grown children and they will be communicated with as to the disposition of the body.

The California promotion committee has put out the following "Bulletin of Progress":

Wonderful activity has been shown in all lines in San Francisco during the month of July and reconstruction work has been pushed with vigor.

There was a loss of \$35,000 of the city's population during the first month after the fire, and it is estimated that more than 200,000 have returned while 50,000 are waiting in nearby cities for accommodations in order that they may return. The present population is estimated at 365,000.

Transcontinental railroads report east-

Transcontinental railroads report east-bound travel as normal, while west-bound travel is far above normal. The number of people receiving relief in the city has been reduced from 225,000 during the first week, to less than 17,000.

Hotel accommodations are now satis-factory and are fast being pleased in

factory and are fast being placed in condition to care for all who may

condition to care for all who may come.

Dealers in all lines note a demand for high class articles. Those who stocked with cheap goods, especially in the line of clothing, have been disappointed and are hurrying orders for better goods.

Seven theatres are playing to good houses every evening. Others are in course of erection.

Labor supply shows but little improvement. There is great demand for ordinary laborers and in all departments of the building trades.

In the state conditions indicate one of the most prosperous years in the history of California. Banks report good business. Crops are exceptionally good, especially grain. Labor is in demand at good wages for harvesting grain and fruit.

# IN JOHNSON CASE

Controversy Over Management of Estate by Administrator Ladd Still Engages Court.

Wood, also for Administrator Ladd, took the floor and will finish this afternoon. Attorney Riddell says he will have some remarks to make after Colonel Wood gets through, which will take about three hours.

Attorney Wood began his arguments this morning by reading the charges made by the Johnson heirs in the petition for the removal of Mr. Ladd. The petition was filed August 29, 1905, and was signed by C. N. Johnson, T. N. Dunbar and J. B. Hibbard. Attorney Wood read letters written to W. M. Ladd by A. H. Johnson before his death and argued that they show that Johnson himself understood that the trust was not to pay all the debts, but was formed for the purpose of creating a fund out of which payments on the debts were to be made.

Counsel argued that the Johnson heirs

Counsel argued that the Johnson heirs understood this but were trying to saddle the entire indebtedness of the estate onto Mr. Ladd. leaving the remainder of the property for the heirs. COMMITTEE AT WORK VISITING INVESTORS

If Results Are Satisfactory Commercial Bodies Will Appoint Board to Proceed With Work of Forming Company and Financing the Deal.

Preliminary steps were taken last night toward the establishment of a Portland-Alaska steamship line. The agitation of the past few weeks bore fruit in a gathering of business men in the parlors of the Portland hotel and plans were made to call at once for subscriptions for the project.

The plan is to appoint first a commit-tee to canvas the business houses which

tee to canvas the business houses which have already expressed willingness to back the enterprise. If a substantial showing can be made the four commercial bodies of the city will combine in a general effort to secure the full amount necessary to finance the company. After a thorough discussion amount necessary to finance the company. After a thorough discussion those present at the meeting last night agreed that \$180,000 will be the minimum sum needed. This is a large amount, but it was feit that it could be raised by resolute and harmonious effect. The money will be raised, the company formed and the policy of the corporation then decided, but it is generally understood that the line will have to begin operations with chartered ships, the \$180,000 to be used in securing proper harbor facilities in Nome, the proposed northern terminal, and in paying the expenses incident to the launching of the business and the securing of patronage.

The preliminary committee will be appointed probably tonight by the president of Portland and will either continue with the company or resume engineering work.

John B. Rogers, the company's new chief engineer. was elected vice-president and director. He will remain in Portland and will have immediate charge of construction work. Next the company organized and the ships in operation by January 1, 1907.
