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MYSTERY SHROUDS THREE WILLS

Appearance of Many Documents in Estate of J. W. Young Makes Complication.

ATTORNEY RECEIVED LAST THROUGH MAIL

Thirty-Five-Thousand-Dollar Estate of Weston Man is Contested for by Women Claiming to Be Lawful Heirs.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Weston, Or., Aug. 11.—Mystery still surrounds the appearance of the third will in the matter of the estate of the late J. W. Young of this place.

This instrument is said to have been executed a little more than a year ago, and therefore it is held to be the other two wills now in dispute.

From all that can be learned the document was mailed to Charles H. Carter, attorney for Mrs. Warner, by some unknown party at Weston who wrote an accompanying letter in a cramped, irregular hand.

There are now three wills of alleged wills in evidence. The first one, executed September 3, 1921, is the will now before the probate court.

The nature of the third and most mysterious will cannot be learned. It is said to be a copy of the will executed in 1921, which leaves her a very nominal sum.

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
