AMERICAN TO EXPOSE HIGH OFFICERS

Marion Churchill Threatens to Drag Others into Court Which Is Trying Dunn.

SAYS LIEUTENANT IS VICTIM OF JEALOUSY

Other Members of Service Are Anxious to Knife Accused Man Because He Was in Higher Favor Than They Were.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) Vallejo, Cal., Aug. 18.—"I dined with other officers than Lieutenant Dunn on the Independence. I am quite willing to take the stand at the courtmartial and tell all about the dinners and entertainments given in my honor on the Independence by Dunn's brother officers."

Such is the burden of a letter Marion Churchill has written to her friends here. When the contents of this letter became known there was consternation among the officers stationed at the yard. Ever since the beginning of Dunn's courtmartial sensational stories have been whispered over the tea cups and over the high balls of the revels that have been held on the Independence for over a year. As many other officers more prominent than Lieutenant Dunn are mentioned in connection with these orgies there seems to be no limit to the scandalous possibilities of the investigation now under way.

Marion Churchill is present in Santa Rosa. There is a persistent rumor here that she visited Vallejo a few days ago and turned over to Attorney Ryan a mass of startling evidence bearing upon the dinners and dances on the famous old training ship in which she participated.

Whether she will personally testify is not known and every one refuses to discuss the possibility of her appearing before the court, but she says: "Marion Churchill cannot be prevented from being a witness if she is willing and I summon her."

In a letter regarding the case she said: "I am very sorry that they have brought trouble to Lieutenant Dunn. He is a good fellow and that is why he is being tried. For the other officers were jealous of him and they took this chance to throw him down with the scoundrels."

The trial was continued today. Immediately upon meeting today, Attorney Ryan stated that as he had had no time to examine the transcript of testimony which was given him this morning, and that he and Lieutenant Churchill would be ready to begin their defense. He said that he would finish the defense Monday.

Dunn was in better spirits today than at any time since the trial. He is much relieved that no more witnesses are to be called against him, and is apparently indifferent to his fate at the hands of the court.

While he would, of course, prefer to remain in the service, he is not worrying a great deal about his future. He is a good fellow and that is why he is being tried. PRESIDENT TO HAVE COSTLIEST OF SALUTES

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) Washington, Aug. 18.—President Roosevelt's first salute from the fleet at Oyster Bay on Labor day will be a discharge of 504 six-inch guns, the biggest and most costly salute in the history of the American navy. Later as he visits each of the warships he will be saluted on arriving and departing by each of the six flagships, the total number being 256 guns, making a grand total of salutes of 760 guns during the review.

The officials having to do with the mobilizing of the ships and the preparation for the review predict the cost of the event will not fall much below \$1,000,000. This is not far short of the cost of sending the American fleet out to battle with the Spanish fleet. The American navy is twice as large today as it was in 1898 and the Atlantic fleet will be in full fighting trim when reviewed by the president.

"Big Stockings, Little Shoes."

TO FIGHT UNIONS.

Citizens' Industrial Association to Oppose All "Trusts."

The Citizens' Industrial Association of America has sent out a notice in which it says: "To check the political ambitions of the union labor leaders the National Citizens' Industrial Association is submitting to political candidates throughout the country two questions: "Have you pledged your support to the union trust or to any other trust, organization or corporation seeking special legislation?" "Will you or will you not represent the citizens as a whole and seek to protect them from class legislation, whether by organized capital or organized labor, when such legislation is in the interest of the few to give power over the many?"

The plan provides that the names of candidates who stand for labor or capitalist trusts shall be supplied to the different citizens' associations now organized in over 500 towns and cities, in order that citizens of all parties can vote for anti-trust candidates at the coming elections.

Natives, incensed at Murder of Comrade, Attack Foreigners.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) Helena, Aug. 18.—Private cablegrams from Carro de Pasco give meager details of what appears to have been a sanguinary battle between Americans and Peruvians, in which at least one Peruvian was killed.

300 MILES OF TERRITORY DEVASTATED IN CHILE

Most Progressive Part of South American Republic in Ruins.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) Buenos Ayres, Aug. 18.—Only the most fragmentary reports are coming from Chile owing to the damage to the trans-Andean wires, but everything points to the fact that one of the greatest disasters of modern times has occurred in the territory tributary to Valparaiso. The arc of circles drawn about the interior with Valparaiso as the center, with a radius of 500 miles will probably cover the worst part of the stricken territory. This includes most of the rich section of the progres-

sive little republic, and within it are dozens of thriving towns.

Most of them are in ruins. The disturbance was felt but not in its full severity in the utmost mountain boundary of the country. There was no shock at La Serena, on the frontier, but subterranean rumblings were distinctly heard.

At this hour, 8 p. m., all hope of stopping the flames has been abandoned. Rapidly the fires are eating their way northward and not a vestige of the buildings is left behind. It is swept clean. As far as the eye can reach is one sea of flames. The fire started at the Plaza de Armas, and the shock had hardly subsided before the streets were lighted up by burning buildings. Many of the engine-houses were in the zone of destruction and the machines were unavailable.
