Loss Company Breaks First Ground at Eastern Terminus of Railway.

THOUSAND WORKMEN WILL BE AT WORK NEXT WEEK

Vast Amounts of Hay and Other Supplies Have Been Bought by Contractors and Everything Is Prepared for Steady Employment.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Drain, Or., Aug. 21.—The first ground was broken last evening for the Drain-Coos Bay railroad. Two hundred and fifty mules, a dozen carloads of scrapers, plows and other tools from California and several carloags of powder, provisions, etc., have arrived already and also enough men to begin work on this

nis and several carloads of powder, provisions, etc., have arrived already and also enough men to begin work on this great undertaking which means so much for southwestern Oregon.

Several hundred more men are expected to arrive this week, when work will be pushed with the utmost vigor. Nearly a thousand tons of hay have been bought by the Loss company between Drain and Elkton, 16 miles west of here and preparations are made for steady work until the road is finished. Work will commence next week on the big 4,000-foot tunnel at Paradise creek about 18 miles west of here. The Loss company has sublet a contract to Cole & Sweeney of Portland to build two smaller tunnels, 11 and 12 miles west of Drain. Each of these tunnels will be about 1,200 feet long.

It is the intention to have 1,000 or 1,200 men at work on the new road within a few days. The wages paid are from \$2.25 up.

Several immense warehouses are being built here in which to store provisions. The 40 by 200-foot shed, in which to store 20,000 barrels of cement is nearing completion and thousands of the barrels have already been stored in it.

All is bustle and excitement at Drain which is sure to grow into a greathriving city within a few years.

The present date is so late that many delegates who otherwise would have attended find themselves unable to do so because their schools are about to open for the winter session.

In return for this Vollva and his friends promised that so soon as the office of general overseer is vested in Vollva the latter will proclaim his faith in the teachings of Dowle and acknowledge his supremacy in all matters pertaining to the church.
