The interesting history of educational effort in Oregon is contained in a scrapbook which has been compiled by Dr. J. W. Hill of the Hill Military Academy. The materials of this book have been added from day to day during Dr. Hill's 29 years of teaching in Portland. The subjects treated are not confined to the schools and educational enterprises in which the compiler has been a figure. As a personal record the book is complete, but in addition it embraces information as to the history and policy of every private school in this state.

In system and arrangement the scrapbook is a model fit for the imitation of literary folk who need to assemble clippings. And this book is an illustration of the finish and order which characterize everything managed by Dr. Hill.

The scrapbook contains essays and discussions upon education which may have local application, news articles about the commencements of the schools, programs of entertainments, clippings from newspapers about mishaps of students, and advertisements in which the different schools have set forth their claims for recognition and patronage. This information, always accessible, must be very valuable to a man actively engaged in lecturing, writing and talking to students.

There are many ways to excite interest. With the anecdotes of school life and student achievement contained in his library of clippings, Dr. Hill is able to make talks to boys which will keep them aroused with curiosity and anticipation. With That Idea in View, Railroads Make Special Rates From the East.

With a hope that eastern laboring men may be induced to come to the Pacific northwest and relieve the unparalleled demand for workmen, the Harriman and Hill railroad lines from Union Pacific to Great Northern territory announce a special rate of \$5 for the one-way trip from Missouri river territory to all points in Oregon and Washington, effective August 20 to September 14.
